

Glenelg rewrote another piece of football history in demolishing Port by 88 points at Adelaide Oval yesterday.

The Tigers' 27-17 (179) was the highest score ever kicked against the Magpies.

 It beat by six points Sturt's 26-17 (173) against Port at Unley in 1974.

• It beat by 17 points Glenelg's previous highest score against Port - 25-12 (162) at Football Park in the 1974 preliminary final. Port It beat by 14 points

Glenelg's previous highest winning margin over Port -74 points at Alberton in 1950 when the scores were Glenelg 17-16 (118) to Port 6-8 (44).

However, it was not Port's biggest losing mar-Torrens defeated Port by

111 points at Thebarton in 1948 — 22-16 (148) to 4-13 (37).

Immediately after yesterday's game, Glenelg were claiming an Australian record for the most number of handpasses in a match.

Their tally of 183 was four fewer than they had against Centrals at the Bay Oval last season when they kicked a record 49-23 (317) to Centrals' 11-13 (79).


# AVALANCHE
