WEAK FOOTY, POOR CROWD BLAME MUST BE SHARED

Four sub-standard league football matches got what they deserved yesterday — a paltry total attendance of 20,689.

South again failed to attract a crowd of 3,000. They have drawn only 8,766 spectators to their first three games against Woodville, Torrens, and West.

Those three clubs also must share the blame for the hefty fall-off in attendances in the first three rounds this season.

Woodville have drawn only 12,530, Torrens 13,003, and West 13,408.

This might all sound a repeat of the poor crowd figures revealed on this page last week.

It is not meant to put the boots into the clubs or the South Australian National Football League, but merely to point out some hard facts.

"Be positive, not negative," SANFL officials might argue.

Well, there was not much of a positive nature to come out of yesterday's third series, in which all four games were criticised for being lack-lustre affairs below the standard expected at league level.

Norwood and Port should

attract a crowd of 15,000-20,000 to Football Park tomorrow.

And the traditional rivals can be expected to put on a show worthy of such a figure.

Norwood, Port, Glenelg, and Sturt will give you value for your \$1.50 admission, at least when they are playing against each other.

Sadly, the other six teams have still to prove they have made any significant improvement from last season.

Under the proud heading "Most Even Start In League History," the Football Budget yesterday carried a lead story which said in part: "... this year's five is wide open.

"Of last year's finalists, only Glenelg, at this stage look certainties for 1976. Oh yeh!

GLENELG WON—BUT DON'T BRAG

Glenelg beat North by 35 points at Football Park, but it was not the sort of win to brag about.

It was, in fact, a game the Glenelg hierarchy and their fans will find difficult to remember when it comes to finals time.

For North, their consolation prize was that they shook the daylights out of the undefeated league side for half the game.

But over the whole game, Glenelg were a much more competent band with a far sounder spread of good players.

The Bays (rather than Tigers) were only a pale shadow of their all-conquering start against Sturt and Port, who finished fourth and third respectively last season.

Glenelg seemed more affected by the holiday atmosphere than North. The Roosters pestered with pace in the first half when they led by eight points (not enough with the handy breeze to the southern end) and trailed by only five points at half-time.

The Bays became more like Tigers after a tongue-lashing by coach Neil Kerley at the long break.

Glenelg were put on their wrong leg early by the approach and tackling tenacity of the opposition.

It was to former Glenelg forward John Sandland that North directed a down-the-middle attack.

And there was North support from Trevor Hill, who could become one of the best half-forward flankers in the game.

But it was not so evident in the last half when North could register only 4-7 to Glenelg's 9-7.

Peter Carey showed up the lack of experience in the North rucks and rover Kym Hodgeman, after a quiet start, gradually began to bring the Bays' big guns into

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Hodgeman finished with 23 kicks, 20 handballs and joined the goalkicking with 2-3 to be best on field.

Glenelg should have "killed off" the game in the second quarter with their first use of the breeze. But they left their accuracy back at Brighton road — kicking only four goals from 12 scoring shots.

They got away from North in the third term, but the Roosters came back at them again to get within 16 points for the run home.

SUPERIOR ATTACK

Then a far superior attack—North booted only one goal in the last term, and that was by reserve Greg Schmidt—set the seal.

There were status duels between Peter Marker-Barry Stringer and Rodney Robran-Colin Anderson to stimulate the sparse attendance (8,401).

Marker and Stringer, playing wide apart, were big aids while Anderson, after a strong second quarter, was tamed by Robran.

Glenelg have now beaten North in their past eight meetings—their biggest sequence against them.
