In two remarkable, shock upsets, South defeated Glenelg by 33 points at Adelaide Oval and Woodville beat Port by seven points at Woodville.

It was South's third successive win, following their successes against Sturt and Torrens.

And it was Woodville's first victory over Port since they were admitted to

the league competition in 1964.

Port were the only side Woodville had

not beaten at league level.

South and Woodville, the two teams no-one wanted to know at the start of the season, have given the competition another inspiring fillip!

IMPERTINENT

Neither side has a match programmed at Football Park this season.

Now the impertinent Panthers and Peckers will be demanding to play at league headquarters so they will be accustomed to the place when they play in the finals!

Yesterday's total attendance was

35,760 compared with 25,490 in the seventh series last season.

Aggregate crowd for the season is only 21,930 down on the figure after seven rounds last year — 288,158 as opposed to 310,088.

Last season, after seven series, the premiership table was: Glenelg (14 points), Sturt (12), Norwood (10), Port, Centrals, and West (eight), North and Woodville (four), South (two), and Torrens (nil).

Woodville finished their game gesterday with only 15 players.

Ruckman Max Parker was taken to hospital with a suspected fracture of the upper jaw, centre half-back Graham Linke was on crutches last night with a badly bruised calf, and half-back flanker Barry Tyrrell had his left arm in a sling because of a suspected .broken collarbone.

Centreman Stephen Parsons and full forward Brian Mulvihill had severely bruised shins.

PANTHER POWER TUMBLES TIGERS

South proved they are more than worthy of league status when they crushed top team Glenelg by 33 points at Adelaide Oval yesterday.

It was one of South's greatest efforts for many seasons, and coach Hadyn Bunton described it as his "biggest thrill for a long time."

"And more important," he said. "It kas the club's biggest thrill for a long time.

"We won because our players had dedication and concentration.

"I can't praise the players enough."

It was a fruly "gutsy"

effort, and the result wasn't a fluke. South played superbly and thoroughly deserved every point they scored.


