Gosling is understood to have suffered facial injuries and will have to lose time from his employ-

The match was hard-fought and there was no room for the faint-hearted.

Heated exchanges were commonplace and players hurled themselves into the fray, with hip and shoulder and shirt-fronts commonplace.

During the second term Bruce Stevenson was unceremoniously dumped after his opponent had outmarked him.

Stevenson received a free kick and Centrals' coach Gary Window had to be restrained by a trainer from running on to the ground, apparently to instruct his men to keep their cool,

Ace Norwood forward Ross Dillon was reported during a scuffle in the Reserves game at Football Park.

Dominant

Darryl Rady exploded across half-forward to lend a hand to Cornes and Copping up forward.

Cornes at centre halfforward, led Stephen Kerley a merry chase.

Norwood tried hard to get back into the game after half-time with an emphasis on handball, but it backfired.

They handballed players already marked and kicked into attack hoping for rather than finding teammates and more often than not, kicking to Bay defenders.

Glenelg's brilliance pinpointed many flaws in the Norwood side and coach Bob Hammond and his team of selectors have plenty of thinking to reestablish the Redlegs to the poise which took them to an NFL championship.

As for the Bays, they've come good at the right end of the season and with their devastating forward set-up are definitely on the premiership trail.
