

# SHORT ODDS ON SUPER STURT

The odds against Sturt reaching the grand final shortened at Unley Oval yesterday when the Blues triumphed again.

They took Norwood apart during the third quarter to run away with the game after an even first half.

What was expected to be a test of Sturt's right to sit at the head of the premiership ladder turned into a third quarter display of their skills.

It is now up to Glenelg to lay down the challenge next week.

But as the season continues the loss Sturt suffered at the hands of West in the sixth round becomes more and more of an enigma.

The final four looks set as it stands, but the fight to fifth place is still wide open following wins to Tor-

rens and Woodville yesterday. Torrens' victory was an indication of their new approach — it was only their second against North in 18 attempts.

## Kerley's sweet revenge

For Neil Kerley it was sweet revenge. Twelve months ago almost to the day North tore Torrens apart at Football Park and kicked a record score against the Eagles.

Yesterday Torrens achieved the same feat. Their final score was a club record over North, beating their previous highest — set in 1959 — by 27 points.

And Woodville's great last quarter against West enabled them to record their biggest score against the Blues, as well as lifting their hopes of slotting into the final five by September.

They went one goal better yesterday than they did in 1970 when they set their previous high score.

For Centrals, their clash with South at Adelaide Oval today is vital if they are to stay in touch with the five.

# Cornes, Hank injured

Glenelg and State captain Graham Cornes was carried off in the last quarter against Port Adelaide yesterday and is very doubtful for Saturday's match against Sturt.

He hobbled out of the Glenelg changerooms on crutches with a sprained left ankle.

Cornes sustained the injury when attempting a spectacular mark.

The ankle is badly swollen and will be treated today and during the week.

Cornes will not be available for Glenelg's NPL quarter-final match against VFA side Coburg at Norwood Oval on Tuesday night.

Port Adelaide full-forward Tim Evans was limping in the last quarter with a jarred knee, but will be fit for Saturday's match

against North Adelaide. West Torrens rover Barry Hank will have a shoulder X-rayed today.

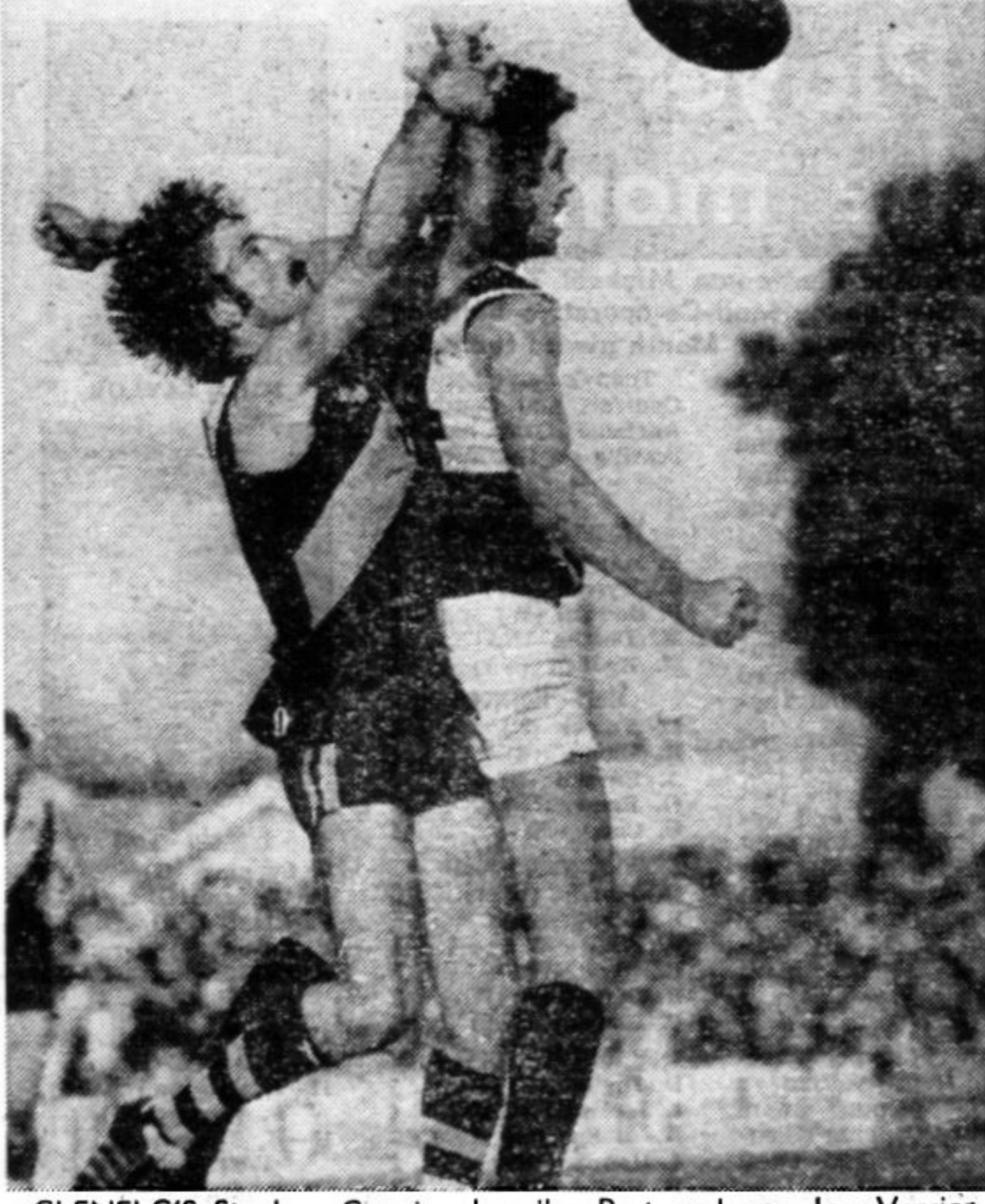
He is most doubtful for next week's match against South, while Eagle centre half-back Henry Dabrowski may also miss with a corked thigh.

Former Carlton player David McKay sustained an

ankle injury the first time he went for the ball in his debut with Torrens, but should be fit for next week.

Woodville's Peter Anderson will have a precautionary X-ray to determine if he has a cracked jaw.

Anderson was met heavily in a pack during the first quarter against West but finished the game.

# Wham! Bay stars turn on power

Glenelg 15-24, Port 14-14

Glenelg ran Port Adelaide into the Bay Oval soil yesterday and shattered the Magpies' confidence with their superb desperation.

The match also proved how much Glenelg's star players are worth when they lifted the Tigers from a losing position to win comfortably by 16 points.

Port led up to 30 seconds into the last quarter and then wham! — Glenelg fired in 15 scoring shots to the Magpies' miserable three.

That scoring effort, and the fact that Glenelg had 31 more kicks in the last quarter, tells the story of how the Bays stormed home and the Magpies wilted under pressure.

Port should have led by at least five goals at half-time, but had to be content with a seven-point lead after throwing countless goals away.

They lacked confidence in attack and, for some reason, persisted in short, ridiculous passes in working the ball down the ground.

Glenelg had few winners up to half-time, were beaten badly in ruck, and their rovers Kym Hodgeman and Peter McInerney were shut out of the game.

But what a change after half-time! Peter Carey went into

ruck and fed Hodgeman, who in turn pounded Glenelg in attack consistently.

Paul Weston, who played in the shadow of Stephen Clifford in the first half, was uncontrolled in the second, and also played a major role in lifting the Bays to a grand win.

Then there was Graham Cornes, who improved immensely as the game wore on, David Johnston, who continued to battle hard, and Fred Phillips, who lifted at full forward.

## Faded out

Meanwhile, the Port brigade faded dismally and their early stars, such as Andy Porpycia, Clifford, Chris Natt and Darrell Cahill were rarely sighted.

Their captain, Russell Ebert and rover Brian

Cunningham, were the only two to carry on their early good efforts.

Glenelg fought back courageously, and once their "big name" players fired, they displayed the teamwork and fierce pressure for which they are renowned.

Stephen Copping, who played in a forward pocket was best on ground, narrowly ahead of Weston.

Copping was one of the few to be consistently good for four quarters, and his three goals in the first half kept Glenelg in touch.

Glenelg coach John Nicholls believed West Torrens had a lot to do with the win over Port.

"The heavy loss to Torrens did us good, and so will the win against Port. Yesterday's win was

very satisfying because we had to work hard in the second half to get there," he added.

Port coach John Cahill thought his side should have been three or four goals up at half-time.

"We played too short and their centre and half-back lines got on top of us in the second half.
