Bulldogs blow race

Glenelg yesterday.

And with Torrens losing to Sturt the composition of the final five may not be known until the last minor round games of the season.

Centrals and Torrens are staging an epic battle for fifth spot, having won the same number of games.

The situation could be the same on September 2, when the last games of the minor round will be contested.

Over the next four weeks Centrals face Port at Alberton, Sturt at Unley, Woodville at Woodville and North at Football Park.

They could lose the first two and win the others.

Torrens face Norwood and Sturt on their own grounds (possible losses) and Woodville at both Thebarton and Woodville (possible wins).

It has been an unpredictable season, but if those were the results, the fifth spot would hinge on the last match, when Centrals meet South and Torrens play

Torrens have the battle on their hands. They face Glenelg at the Bay, while Centrals have South at Elizabeth.

The Eagles would have to win that last game to make the five on percentage.

They received another setback yesterday, however, when Barry Hank was admitted to the Queen Elizabeth Hospital after being concussed in the match against Sturt.

Hank dropped heavily after colliding with Sturt's Trevor Sims in the second quarter.

He is likely to miss at least one match.

Torrens also reported injuries to rover, Ian Jackman (ankle) and forward, Chris Kellett (knee) which will be further assessed today.

North's big win over South put paid to any chance the Panthers had of making the five, so they'll have to rest on their NFL grand final laurels.

South would have to win all of their remaining games while Torrens or Centrals won only two.

And West must beat Norwood at Richmond today

to hold the slimmest hope of a finals berth. They would then have an identical chance to that

of South.

Centrals 11-11, Glenelg 5-16

Glenelg's miserable attempts to play football continued yesterday when they fumbled and floundered their way to a 31-point defeat at the hands of Centrals.

The Bulldogs relished the sloppy, slippery conditions at Glenelg Oval to really rub the mud into the bedraggled Bays.

It was Glenelg's third straight loss in eight days but, more importantly, they've booted a meagre 14 goals in those three games -and that must be desperately worrying coach John Nicholls.

The Tigers were at their worst. Centrals did play good football but can still improve.

That's the sad fact about the game. It wasn't that Centrals played so brilliantly, it was just that Glenelg performed poorly as a team possibly could.

Bustled

But full marks to the Bulldogs-they bustled the Bays off their game, backed up all day and kept running for four quarters.

Centrals began best with two goals in the first five minutes into the wind to put the Tigers off their game.

Halfway through the quarter Glenelg's Paul Weston went down with concussion after a heavy tackle, then Daryl Rady copped one in the eye and both players had to leave the ground.

The Bulldog drive came the mountainous from Peter Maksimovic in ruck. Dean Mobbs around centre and Gary Rae following.

In defence they had young Greg Mutze shutting out the Bays at full back and Lyle Skinner coping superbly on a half back flank.

Glenelg's only shining lights were Peter Carey, with 14 strong marks, David Holst and captain Graham Cornes.

Centrals steadied. Max George flashed into the game for the first time, kicked two goals, Norsworthy added another and that was that.

Peter Johnston had kept Centrals' Peter Beythien in check for most of the game but coach Daryl Hicks switched him on to the ball and he gave the Bulldogs the necessary drive in the last term to make sure of victory.

Hicks still won't predict Centrals will make the five, but with three successive wins against Norwood, Torrens and now Glenelg they now must have a very strong chance.

Then there's Glenelg. They have several key players out but will need to improve immensely to be considered serious premiership contenders.
