

DEFINED ROBERTS REPORTED and Roosters hatter Bloods

Torrens star Neville Roberts will appear before the SANFL Tribunal on Tuesday night for the second time in a fortnight.

But this time he will be the central figure, after being reported during the Torrens-Woodville clash at Football Park yesterday.

A fortnight ago he gave evidence when Centrals' Michael Koch appeared on a charge of striking Roberts.

The Eagle forward was reported by umpire Laurie Argent in the second quarter for allegedly attempting to strike an un-named Woodville player.

Roberts is the fourth Torrens player to be reported this season.

The others were Dirk Inglis and Milan Faletic, who were both found not guilty, and Ricky Searle who received a severe reprimand.

The report was the only sensation from yesterday's matches, in which North pulled off an upset win over one of last year's finalists - West.

It doesn't often happen that a team which kicks only two goals in three quarters of football gets a win, but it did at Glenelg yesterday.

Glenelg turned what looked like a five-goal breeze into a 10-5 breeze and that was the end of Norwood.

The Redlegs battled all day to get back into the game and almost made it when they ran on in the final quarter.
