## Oh, what a season

Two more upsets and a mild surprise yesterday left West Torrens the only unbeaten team after the fourth round of league football.

All ten teams would still fancy their final five chances after a most even start to the 1979 season.

Shrewd programming has contributed to the evenness of the competition, in which two sides have won three games, five have had two wins, and the other three have recorded one victory each.

Last year's top teams have played each other, as have, of course, the lower sides.

Not after nine rounds will there be a clearer guide to the composition of the final five.

A total attendance of not quite 30,000 at yesterday's four games was poor in view of the perfect weather conditions and the uncertainty of the results.

That West Adelaide and North Adelaide could attract only 4386 spectators to Richmond was a damning indictment of their supporters.

Similarly, 6000 crowds at Football Park and Thebarton must disturb league administrators.

### Shock

South Adelaide's five-

goal defeat of boom side Central District at Football Park was the biggest shock, followed by Port Adelaide's 25-point win over Glenelg at Alberton before a crowd of 12,775.

North's 32-point success against West was something of a surprise, despite the Roosters' great win over Glenelg last week.

While Torrens is undefeated, it faces a critical test of its ability and potential over the next six weeks, with games against South (Adelaide Oval), Sturt (Thebarton), Port (Alberton), Glenelg (Football Park), North (Thebarton), and Norwood (Football Park).

Similarly, South, second, and Central, third, have tough programs ahead.

### Tough

South plays Torrens (Adelaide), Glenelg (Football Park), West (Adelaide), Norwood (Adelaide), Sturt (Football Park), and Port (Adelaide) in its next six matches.

Central meets Glenelg (Glenelg), Woodville (Elizabeth), Norwood (Norwood), Sturt (Elizabeth), Port (Alberton), and West (Elizabeth).

# COURAGE DID IT, SAYS CAHILL

Port Adelaide coach John Cahill described his team's winning performance against Glenelg as the greatest display of courage since Port won the 1977 premiership from Glenelg.

The game was a battle of the defences and both full backs, Trevor Sorrell (Port) and Keith Kuhlmann (Glenelg) must have the State position between them if the selectors go on form.

Sorrell punched the ball away and cleared cleverly and held Stephen Copping

down to a point with assistance from nearby team mates, especially half back flankers Tony Giles and Ivan Eckerman.

Newcomer Greg Natt took some great marks and on yesterday's fine performance, should be a regular player for some time.

### Battled

Port's ace full forward, Tim Evans, kicked five goals but Kuhlmann made him work for them and three of them resulted from good team work by Port.

Port had so many good players and it was hard separating half-forward flanker Mark Williams and rover Brian Cunningham as its best.
