'BEST EAGLE SIDE IN 20 YRS' ... says a jubilant Head

It's official! West Torrens IS a new power in league football.

"This is the best balanced, most tenacious Torrens side I've seen in the past 20 years," jubilant club president, Mr Lindsay Head, said after the Eagles' fighting 16-point defeat of Sturt at Unley yesterday.

Mr Head, the triple Magarey Medallist, added: "You can use all the adjectives you like. I've never seen a Torrens side play as desperately as that."

"When the old legs went, the young legs took over in the last quarter. That's the hallmark of a good side."

"We have arrived." Torrens captain Neville Roberts said: "This is the most complete Torrens side I've played in. We have a good distribution of players with the right height, weight, strength and skill."

"They are a bunch of thinkers, too. It was a

great fightback in the last quarter. A lot of Torrens teams in the past would have folded and everyone would have said: 'Good effort, but bad luck'."

Tigers show their killer instinct

An emotional Glenelg coach John Halbert was full of praise for his players after they over-ran Central District by a massive 62 points at Glenelg Oval yesterday.

"It was a great compliment for the way they approached the game physically and mentally after a heavy program. It was a credit to them," he said.

Glenelg slammed eight goals in the last quarter—five in time-on—and destroyed the theory about players not being physically able to play three matches in a week.

After losing to North Melbourne by five points last Tuesday night, the Tigers approached yesterday's match with the same fierce desire.

It was a truly professional effort. Hicks said Glenelg won because it was the better side on the day.

"It won the key positions, especially across centre, and we handballed to the ground too often. We made too many unforced errors," Hicks said.

Errors

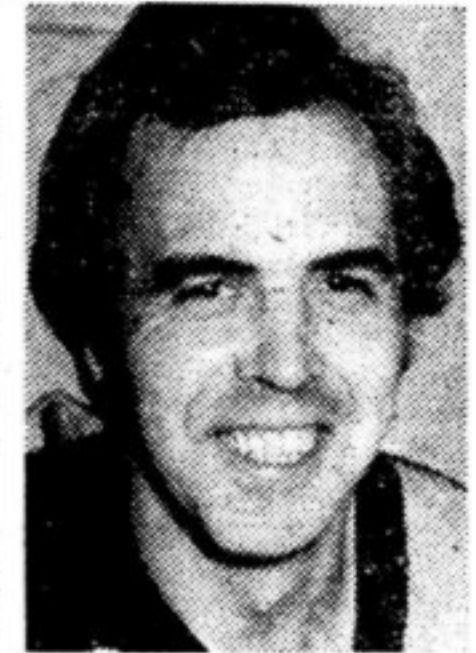
"Due to an outstanding draw, we will play Glenelg at Glenelg again later this year. We will work on being a better side for then."

Glenelg set the pace from the first quarter when ruckman Peter Carey took two strong marks near the goalsquare and goaled both times.

Central was always chasing Glenelg, and when it made comeback attempts in the second and third quarters, Glenelg bounced back and goaled.

So many contributed for Glenelg in a fine team effort, and any of six players could have been judged best on ground.

Carey got the top rating. His goals in the first quarter inspired Glenelg, he was strong in ruck with 21 taps, and brought teammates into the play with 10 kicks and nine

handballs.

Captain Paul Weston was brilliant at centre, and he, too, found teammates and pushed his side into attack with 18 kicks and 16 handballs.

Follower Graham Cornes, wingman David Marshall, rover Peter McInerney and Hodgeman, and defenders David Holst and Keith Buhlmann all gave excellent efforts.

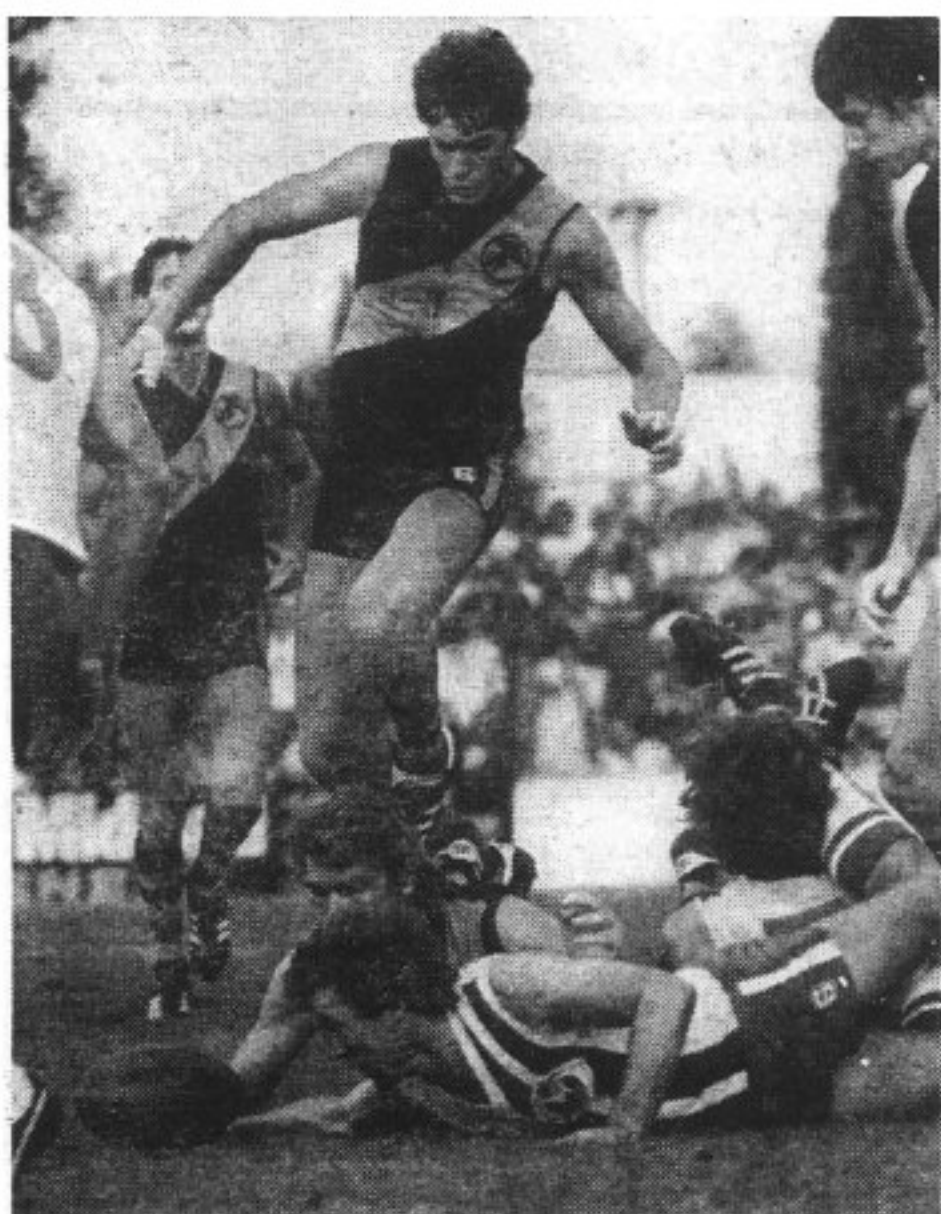
McInerney is playing 100 per cent better than he did last year and his pace and teamwork is just one of the many reasons why Glenelg has improved.

Central got plenty of drive from Dean Mobbs on a half-forward flank and was its best. Carey must be still feeling his side after Mobbs gave him a perfect hip and shoulder in the second quarter.

Dangerous

Follower Peter Jonas was good in patches and was responsible for Central's comeback in the second quarter, while rover Mark Norseworthy and wingman Peter Vivian were dangerous.

Central's comeback in the second quarter when it reduced Glenelg's 28-point lead to only eight points was shortlived when Hodgeman and McInerney kicked goals at the 31 and 32 minutes mark.
