Glenely dismissed any claim it could not withstand immense pressure by hanging on for a thrilling one point victory over Norwood at Football Park

The Tigers took a twopoint lead after 12 minutes of play in the second term, and from then on withstood every challenge the game and a youthfullooking Norwood side pro-

The match was a test of determination and courage with the ball consistently rebounding from each other's half-back line most of the day.

There was only spasmodic passages of classy play, but that was expected as both were relentless with pressure and pursuit of the ball.

Perhaps, the loneliest man at Football Park after the match was Norwood rover Steve Hoffmann who "muffed" a golden opportunity Norwood to hit the lead in the dying stages.

It can win under pressure

He received a handball 30 metres out, bounced and lost the ball, tripped over himself, and watched a Glenelg defender swoop and clear.

Norwood coach and acting captain Neil Balms, said after the match no

one should blame Hoffmann for Norwood losing the match.

Mistakes

"We lost the match because of too many mistakes in the third term, and not just because of one mistake made by a player who did well to receive the ball," Balme said.

"Everyone will recall Steve's mistake because it happened at a crucial stage but it would be unfair to pinpoint the loss to one man because it was the team effort."

Both Balme and Glenelg coach John Halbert were particularly pleased with the way their players went in hard for the ball and coped under the extreme pressure.

While Norwood recorded four more scoring shots and lost by a point, the Tigers were more inaccurate as they kicked out on the full six times while shooting for goal.

Graham Cornes, who broke Glenelg's club games record with 276 senior appearances unfortunately was responsible for three of those out of bounds.

Glenelg's full-back Keith Kuhlmann was outstanding with his clever handball to team-mates and the way he repeatedly punched the

ball clear of grasping Norwood forwards.

Balme, who has been a major link in Norwood's scoring since his return to playing five weeks ago, was restricted to two points.

Centreman Ralph Sewer again rated highly for Glenelg, playing well apart from Danny Jenkins, who also produced a sound effort.

Daryl Rady gave a fine performance for Glenelg on the ball and in the forward line, but marred his effort when he was reported for allegedly striking Hoffmann late in the second term.

Glenelg kept itself well in contention with a desperate third term, and Rady and highly promising centre - half forward Stephen Kernahan, figured prominently.

Norwood had a number of players who contributed, including Michael and Andrew Alsh, Gary Menzel, Thomas. Keith Bruce Winter, who did well to restrict Cornes to two goals, and ruckman Ugo Colasante, who seemed frustrated when penalised by the umpires.

Norwood had players in its team aged under 20, and they all did well, providing plenty of enthusiasm, drive and determination.
