In true Hollywood style, the Magpies turned in a solid gold Oscar winning performance to inflict Glenelg's first defeat of the 1981 season.

A packed Brighton Road Oval saw Port change the face of the game mid-way through the second term and serve notice that it is now again a premiership contender.

The Magples won by 21 points proving that the premier is well and truly back after a horror start to the year.

Halbert said, predictably, that he was pleased with Glenelg's first quarter and a half.
