Poor South Adelaide. All dressed up against Glenelg at Adelaide Oval yesterday, but nowhere to go.

Trailing by 21 points at half-time, the panting Panthers were not in the same class as the top-of-the-table Tigers.

Goal-less in the first quarter, South added six in the first 15 minutes of the second term but that was about where its joy ended.

Not to be outdone, Glenelg rattled home three goals in time-on of the same quarter, and was well in control.

Without the ever elusive Phil Collins and Wayne Slattery (both injured) and suspended centre half forward John Schneebichler, South looked ordinary.

When top rover Mark Naley suffered an ankle injury in the first quarter there were further problems.

Glenelg had sure fire winners in ruckman Peter Carey and captain Paul Weston.

Carey's class was never further evident than in the eighteenth minute of the third quarter.

Value

Wandering about in front of goal, about 25m

out, he nonchalantly plucked a one-handed mark out of the air after a pass from Ralph Sewer, who was deep on the right flank.

Then Carey proceeded to goal with ease, making up for an earlier blemish from right in front in the goalsquare.

Weston was the "General" as he marshalled the Tiger troops from the half back line, ensuring most avenues of attack were shuttered.

Rover John Paynter was immense value, especially in front of goal.

David Holst was always strong in defence, while young Stephen Kernahan proved Carey's ideal deputy in ruck duties.

Impossible

Glenelg is desperate for a talented full forward.

Still winning matches without a notable spearhead, one wonders how

good the Tigers would be had they a "jumping Jack" in the front line.

Ruckman Robb Hawkins was easily South's best, but even his form fell a little in the final term as it became more evident his side was trying for the impossible.

Half-back Gary Mousley celebrated his 199th league game with a workman like effort, as did Graham Brooksby in defence.

Forward Shane Butler had a host of touches but apart from captain Geoff Baynes, Robin White and Paul Harradine, there were few other Panthers worth their day's wages.

Despite the Glenelg win, coach John Halbert summed up the situation in the dressing room.

"That was the one we wanted, but we'll just take it one step at a time," he said.

Fans stay away

The chilling winter winds kept the crowds away from yesterday's 14th round of league football matches.

All games promised some intense action, but it was Elizabeth which played host to the biggest attendance, 11,189.

Only 8065 people watched the Adelaide Oval clash between Glenelg and South, while at Unley it was worse still... only 5455.
