The fluctuating fortunes of football presented a series of surprises in yesterday's third round.

The two unbeaten pacesetters of the competition — West Adelaide and South Adelaide registered their first losses

And in a stunning reversal of form Central District turned the tide on Norwood for an upset win at Adelaide Oval.

South put in a courageous effort against Sturt at Unley, but West were overpowered North Adelaide at Prospect.

Torrens also displayed newfound abilities, pushing last year's premiers Port Adelaide to the very hilt at Alberton Oval.

The Eagles' bold challenge against Port was especially impressive because the Magpies had the advantage awesome

Glenelg continued on its merry way, storming away from Woodville for a percentage win at Football Park.

A bustling Woodville trained by just 29 points at the 20-minute mark of the third term at Football Park yesterday.

Woodville fans must have been hoping upon hope for a respectable Peckers' score, albeit another loss.

But, like an axe falling on a chicken, Glenelg ended the survival when Peckers' slammed through 13-10 in the final term while keeping Woodville scoreless.

What better man to describe what caused the scoring shut down by Woodville than coach Rod Olsson?

"Everything we talked about became a non-event," he said, "we just gave up possession of the ball.

"Our skills let us down badly in the final quarter. We just did not work hard enough.

"It was disheartening to see our players not shutting off Glenelg's run on game. Glenelg was able to run as it liked. "Our use of the ball from the

back lines was poor in that final term." Woodville pressured Glenelg for

two and a half quarters.

A feature of the Peckers' game

was they continued to fight back every time Glenelg started a scoring run.

Glenelg displayed its power in the final term and showed 100 per cent concentration by running out the match. It could have been a danger

game for Glenelg as it beat last year's grand finalist Port Adelaide and Norwood in the past fortnight and was playing the bottom side which had suffered 120 and 93 point losses. Coach John Halbert said he was

happy with the atmosphere before the game.

"The boys prepared themselves well," he said.

"They wanted to put in a good performance for Ralph Sewer. They took this as an extra spur."

Sewer, in his first clash with the club he served for 12 years, gave a creditable performance at centre, shading Woodville's new recruit Noel McCormack.

But it was two other former Woodville players who also proved thorns for the Peckers in halfforward Leon Twelftree, who kicked four goals, and ruckman Colin MacVicar. Perhaps one of the most pleas-

ing aspects for Glenelg from the one sided match was the greatly improved form by half-forward Stephen Copping. He grabbed 24 kicks, 13 hand-

balls, 17 marks and used most of his possessions to advantage. He finished with 6-2 and

headed the goal kicking list for the match. Copping was among a number of Glenelg players to rank highly

in the team's best players.
