SUPER NORTH

Magpies down by 50 pts.

North Adelaide, blitzed and bounced down the ladder by Glenelg last week, stormed back into top form with a crushing victory over Port Adelaide at Alberton yesterday.

The Roosters' stunning reversal of form was the biggest shock in yesterday's round, which was riddled with surprise results on the first wet and slippery Saturday of the season.

Their resounding 50-point victory at Alberton was a further cruel blow to Port, wallowing out of the five and desperate to regain the power which gained it last year's premiership.

It was North's first win at Port's home ground since 1972, and its biggest there since 1947.

For the Roosters' courageous coach Mike Nunan it was a personal triumph because he dragged himself back from injury to lead his side in yesterday's vital clash.

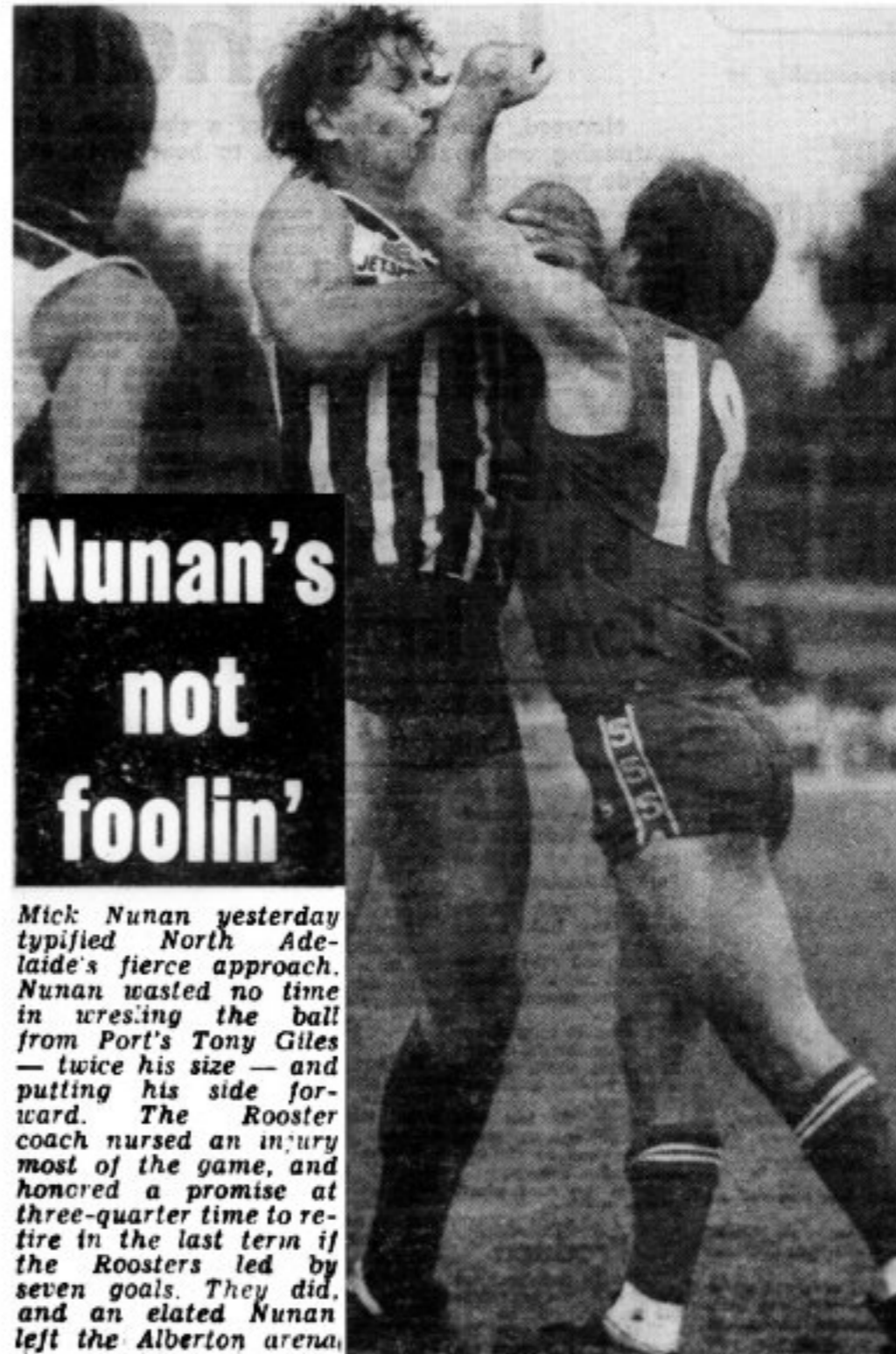
Norwood triumphed over much-improved South Adelaide at the Parade yesterday, but the victory was laced with distressing injuries.

The Redlegs were rocked last week by the serious injuries to gallant rover Greg Turbill and half-back Frank Stemper.

Central District regained stature with an excellent win over West Adelaide.

At Woodville Oval Sturt dispelled all hopes of Woodville's first victory of the year with a magnificent 161-point win.

Woodville, after looking so promising against Port last Saturday, failed to goal until the third term and registered the lowest first half score since World War I.



Nunan's not foolin'

Mick Nunan yesterday typified North Adelaide's fierce approach. Nunan wasted no time in wresting the ball from Port's Tony Giles — twice his size — and putting his side forward. The Rooster coach nursed an injury most of the game, and honored a promise at three-quarter time to retire in the last term if the Roosters led by seven goals. They did, and an elated Nunan left the Alberton arena.

Tigers shoot down Eagles

The Eagle got a claw down at Thebarton yesterday, almost landed then chose to wait for another day as Glenelg charged home in the final term to retain its unbeaten run.

For three quarters Torrens battled its heart out and by three quarter time, trailing by just eight points, looked capable of causing an upset.

But three goals in the first five minutes, to Daryl Rady, Michael Lunnis and Chris McDermott, put paid to any chances of a surprise.

Glenelg's sudden surge of power left Torrens flat-footed and paved the way for a 43-point win.

Ralph Sewer was outstanding for the Tigers.

It was a stirring battle, marred only by the Eagles' inability to put together two good, constructive quarters.

There was enough good football from Torrens to suggest the side is capable of causing upsets — but at a later date.

Its form yesterday would have been good enough to

beat lesser sides. But not a combination as powerful as Glenelg.

Credited

Eight goals in the final term to Glenelg was far too much to expect Torrens to match.

Glenelg coach John Halbert described the Eagles performance: "I think Torrens tried hard and placed a lot of pressure on us."

"They ran the ball well and often played excellent football."

"It was certainly a good last quarter by us."

Torrens coach Lindsay Head said his side was playing well each week.

"We only played badly against West Adelaide," he said.

"When you've got 15 players capable of playing league football injured you have to get some of the breaks."

"And we needed a few breaks today."

"It's a case of the rich getting richer and the poor getting poorer."

Glenelg had sure-fire winners in Sewer in the centre, ruckman Peter Carey, rover Peter McInerney and forwards Stephen Copping and John Paynter.

Sewer cut the Torrens' defence to ribbons, while Carey was credited with 26 taps, despite having a big battle with Rod Galt in the rucks.

Michael Lunniss had a host of touches on the flanks and young McDermott hardly put a foot wrong.

Ironically, Galt also was credited with 26 tap outs and once again proved his worth.

Centreman Trevor Hill gave Torrens plenty of drive and had a "right royal" battle with Sewer. Kevin McSparran showed glimpses of brilliance, while Craig Marriott put in a busy performance.

And still on the brighter side for the Eagles, the performance of John Cunningham at full back was encouraging.
