Port hot tip for hat trick

Port Adelaide is now a red-hot favorite to win the 1981 league football premiership after its 54-point victory over Glenelg in yesterday's second semi-final at Football Park.

The win before a crowd of 35,002 launched Port Port straight into its third Gleneig 1.4 grand final in a row. It will Glenelg-Norwood preliminary final. It will be trying for its hat trick of premierships in the knowledge that it has handed out heavy defeats to both those sides in recent weeks.

And while Glenelg and Norwood do battle for the right to have another crack at Port, the Magpies will be waiting and resting.

As jubilant Port coach John Cahill said after yesterday's win: "Everything has gone perfectly to plan. We needed to win for the week's rest to get over a couple of nagging injuries."

Glenelg coach John Halbert said afterwards: "We certainly aren't going to panic.

"The players we used today are the players who have performed well for us all year, so we are not going to throw the side around recklessly.

"That game is now history. There is nothing we can do about it except, we hope, learn something.

"But yes, there will be some changes, and it remains to be seen if we pick the right side that will give us another crack at Port Adelaide."

Port put the screws on faster than an undertaker. It did not give Glenelg time to get balanced; time even to think about what

was happening.

It was the winner in a tough, punch-laden first term and then won the game in the second quarter when it stacked on nine goals to three by Glenelg to lead by a demoralising 61 points at half-time.

Down by 10 goals and with only 18 fit players because of injuries to Graham Cornes and Daryl Rady, Glenelg was a bit like that elephant washer at the zoo — it found it had a really big job in front of

And while it outscored Port by seven points in the second half - 9.11 to 9.4 it was never going to win.

Glenelg never came to terms with Port's overall team game - the running, even quicker tackling.

But it also could not handle the individual skills of Port players all over the ground.

Follower Bruce Abernethy was devastating. His explosive pace, long kicking and persistence early. was never tamed by a succession of Glenelg opponents and coupled with Brian Cunningham, who must be playing as well as he ever did, Port was altacks from the packs.

Glenelg's pain did not end there.

The Port centreline was the most consistently

damaging line all day.

Russell Ebert in the centre, although not at his best, still hurt Glenelg badly. But it was the wingmen, Tony Martyn and Kim Kinnear, who hurt it most.

Glenelg was pummelled into the Football Park turf by Port Adelaide and once again disgruntled Tiger supporters were asking why their team cannot perform in finals.

Yesterday's second semi-final was Glenelg's sixth consecutive loss in a final and extended its drought to seven years since it has beaten the Magpies in a major round battle.

And the bullet which pierced the hearts was a stunning nine goal second term which eventually proved the margin when the siren ended the onesided fight.

The reasons why Port won were plentiful. It had too much class; pace, aggression, depth and an uncanny ability to know where each player was on the field and to find him with deadly passes.

But Glenelg had . enough of those qualities to clinch the minor premiership. Where along the line did it lose them?

Obviously, too many players are down on form, but why?

Players like Jim Lihou who played in a back pocket for South Australia against WA in June but played in the reserves on Saturday, half-back David Holst who has not shown his brilliance since injuring an ankle last year and Peter McInerney who

Ralph Half-forward Sewer had a disastrous Introduction to finals football with only five kicks and was reported, while another recruit from a bottom club, Peter Cousins, collected only six.

Meanwhile, the Magples have found themselves in yet another grand final and have the chance to record a hat-trick of premierships. Only three times before - by Port twice and by Sturt - has such a feat been accomplished.

Port wrapped up yesterday's second semi-final with its second term effort and coach John Cahill made an interesting half-time speech.

He asked his players to forget about the first half and started his pre-match build-up once again.
