Tony tip for medal

Glenelg's explosive young rover Tony McGuinness is a 6/4 favorite to win the 1982 Magarey Medal.

Latest betting charts put McGuinness clear of his Sturt's nearest rivals, Michael Graham and South Adelaide's Mark

Graham, winner of The News Coopers \$2000 Jervis Cup, and Naley runner up for the Magarey Medal last year - both

The medal winner will be announced on Monday night in a special presentation at the Old Lion Hotel, North Adelaide.

Chance

The medal count will be tel-vised live from 9.30

There are a number of "dark horses" for . the medal this year and bookmakers are not risking any of the star players at blg odds.

Port's Greg Phillips is an 8/1 chance, ahead of North's John Riley 10/1, West's Ian Borchard is 12/1, while Central's John and Glenelg's Platten Stephen Kernahan are both 15/1 pops.

West Torrens' Kym Dillon won the SANFL Reserves Magarey Medal after voting last week.

Woodville's Steven Goldsworthy won the Tomkins Medal for the best and fairest in the league's Under 19s competition, and Chris Davies (North Adelaide) won the McCallum Medal for best and fairest in the Under 17s.

OTAYELPFROM Glenelg 19–21, Central 12–13

For the fifth successive season, the elimination final degenerated to anticlimax when Glenelg outclassed a luckless Central District at Football Park yesterday.

The Bulldogs stormed into the finals with seven consecutive wins and were ready to take on the "world," only to fail to raise a yelp.

Central failed to exist as a contestant at the sixminute mark of the second term when its centre halfforward Michael Wright was carried off on a stretcher.

Glenelg From then, seized complete control and marched to an effort-50-point victory.

The gamble to play Wright, who was suspect during the week with a torn cartilege in his left knee, failed.

What made his loss even more critical was the serious injury to back pocket Ian McKay late in the first quarter. He suffered a dislocated left shoulder and a broken collarbone.

The injuries, pressure, and unforced errors eroded Central's confidence and concentration. The unit which was credited with so much bite before the match became unbalanced and toothless.

Glenelg was forceful and positive in its approach to the ball and was prepared to go in hard — like a finalist should.

Elusive

It judged the fall of the ball better with running scouting players packs and gaining possessions. And more importantly the Bay players did something useful with the ball.

Central made Glenelg look even better when it repeatedly handballed and kicked to opposition play-

ers, put the ball to the ground and dribbled kicks off their boots.

The turning point came when Wright left the field. Glenelg kicked two quick goals to race to a 25point lead.

Central had the chance keep within reach moments later when halfforward Geoff Gillies ran towards goal and missed an easy chance. Glenelg rebounded and within a Tony minute rover McGuinness kicked one of his five goals.

Coach Daryl Hicks made many moves throughout the match but all were in vain. Glenelg was simply too strong, fast and classy in most positions.

Best afield was Stephen Kernahan whose brilliance and coolness under pressure is becoming more remarkable every match.

Switching at full forward and in ruck with Peter Carey, Kernahan

lifted the Tigers repeat-

He took an amazing 17 marks - most of them under pressure — and made full use of 23 kicks, 10 hit-outs, five hand-He was rewarded balls. with three goals.

Glenelg captain Paul Weston provided much sting at centre half-forward and proved enormous headache Peter Beythien who was too slow off the mark,

David Holst controlled the centre and fed running Tigers while David Marshall injected plenty of drive into attack from his wing.

Carey took strong marks around the ground and well. rucked while McGuinness produced his usual dash and was elusive.

Glenelg's defence was rock solid. It worked well as a unit and was disciplined. Rated highly were Maynard Peter Stephen Barratt.

Half-back John McFarlane was forced off with a shoulder injury and concussion in the third term and is doubtful for next Saturday's first, semi-final against today's winner of the qualifying final.

Rover John Platten was easily Central's best player. · Again he showed great desperation and courage, and was creative with 24

kicks.

The Bulldogs had few other winners, but of those who were persistent and battled well, half-back William Hurn and captain Dean Mobbs were amongst them.

Mobbs started at halfforward and later went into the centre in a bid to contain Holst.

Central could not complain about the umpires, Des Foster and Rick Kinnear. It received 44 frees compared with Glenelg's

MacFarlane likely to miss

GLENELG half-back John McFarlane seems certain to miss next Saturday's first semifinal because of concussion and a

shoulder injury. He collided with an opponent in the third term and showed courage when he continued to fight for the ball and eventually smother it, preventing a Central run-on.

McFarlane collapsed in agony after the effort and was carried off the field on a stretcher.

Central back pocket Ian McKay suffered a dislocated left shoulder and a broken collarbone late in the first quarter.

He was in an ambulance which started to head for a hospital in Hindmarsh when it was called back to take another passenger -Michael Wright who again damaged his left knee.

Both had operations last night. The smallest margin in the elimination final in the past five years has been 33 points when Norwood beat West Adelaide last - ASHLEY PORTER. year.
