Magnificent fighting machine

Glenelg produced two of its finest hours of football and snatched victory over Norwood in the dying seconds of an epic struggle at Football Park yesterday.

A towering punt kick by Glenelg captain Paul Weston bounced through for a goal at the 30 minute mark to change the lead for the fifteenth and last time.

And the grand finale to a superb contest shattered the Redlegs who came from behind in the last term and seemed to have a double chance in the finals firmly in their grasp.

Understandably, there were errors under the intense and flerce pressure.

But none more critical than the costly error by Glenelg full back Keith Kuhlmann, who attempted to kick the ball along the ground out of bounds 30m back towards Norwood's goal, only to kick out on the full.

Tenacious

Jim Thiel goaled from the free and moments Neville later Roberts kicked his fifth goal to give Norwood the lead at the 21 minute mark.

While a leser side would have been rocked by Norwood's comeback, Glenelg fought back tenaciously and was rewarded by its persistence.

Both teams applied tremendous pressure and refused to give in. It was no surprise to find the biggest margin in the match was 15 points, held Norwood midway through the second term.

Glenelg was without suspended players Peter Carey and Peter Maynard, but like a good side should, others lifted their performances and covered the losses.

Teamwork

Youngster Stephen Kernahan was outstanding in ruck, beating all before him, and his skills and desperation kept the Tigers going.

As an example of Kernahan's artistry and Glenelg's impeccable teamwork, in the third term he tapped the ball behind him and found rover Tony McGuinness who, in turn, handballed 20m and found Weston who booted one of his magical four goals.

It was that type of direct, positive play which made Glenelg look so good.

Apart from Weston and Kernahan, those who rated highly for Glenelg included wingman David Marshall, centre half-back Graham By Ashley Porter

Cornes, Barratt in a back pocket and McGuinness.

Glenelg coach John Halbert gave John Mac-Farlane a shadowing role against Michael Aish while the Norwood star was at centre and at half-forward.

Although Aish was constructive and collected 22 kicks and 17 handballs, MacFarlane did a reasonable job and prevented Aish from having the influence he can have on a game.

Norwood's other top players included defender Paul Adler, wingman Duncan Fosdike, follower Keith Thomas and defender Frank Stemper.

Shadowed

Glenelg's David Holst tried hard to contain Neville Roberts and almost succeeded until the Norwood ace kicked two goals in the last term.

As expected in all games, tempers flared with several umpiring but overall decisions, Des Foster and Peter Mead gave positive umpiring performances and played their roles in a great exhibition of Australian football,
