BAYS SUPREME... ...PECKERS SO CLOSE

A crushing victory to Glenelg over West Adelaide . . . and Woodville so near, yet so far from their first win of the season.

These were the highlights of yesterday's matches, marking the end of the first half of the minor round.

Glenelg moved into second place with its huge win over the Bloods, but Port is poised to challenge the placing in the game against West Torrens at Football Park today.

It was a display of brilliant football by Glenelg yesterday in a game that demoralised West after it went to the Bay Oval promising so much.

Among the many highlights of that game was the three-goal effort of former Norwood player Brenton Hartfield, who looks destined to hold down a key attacking position for Glenelg.

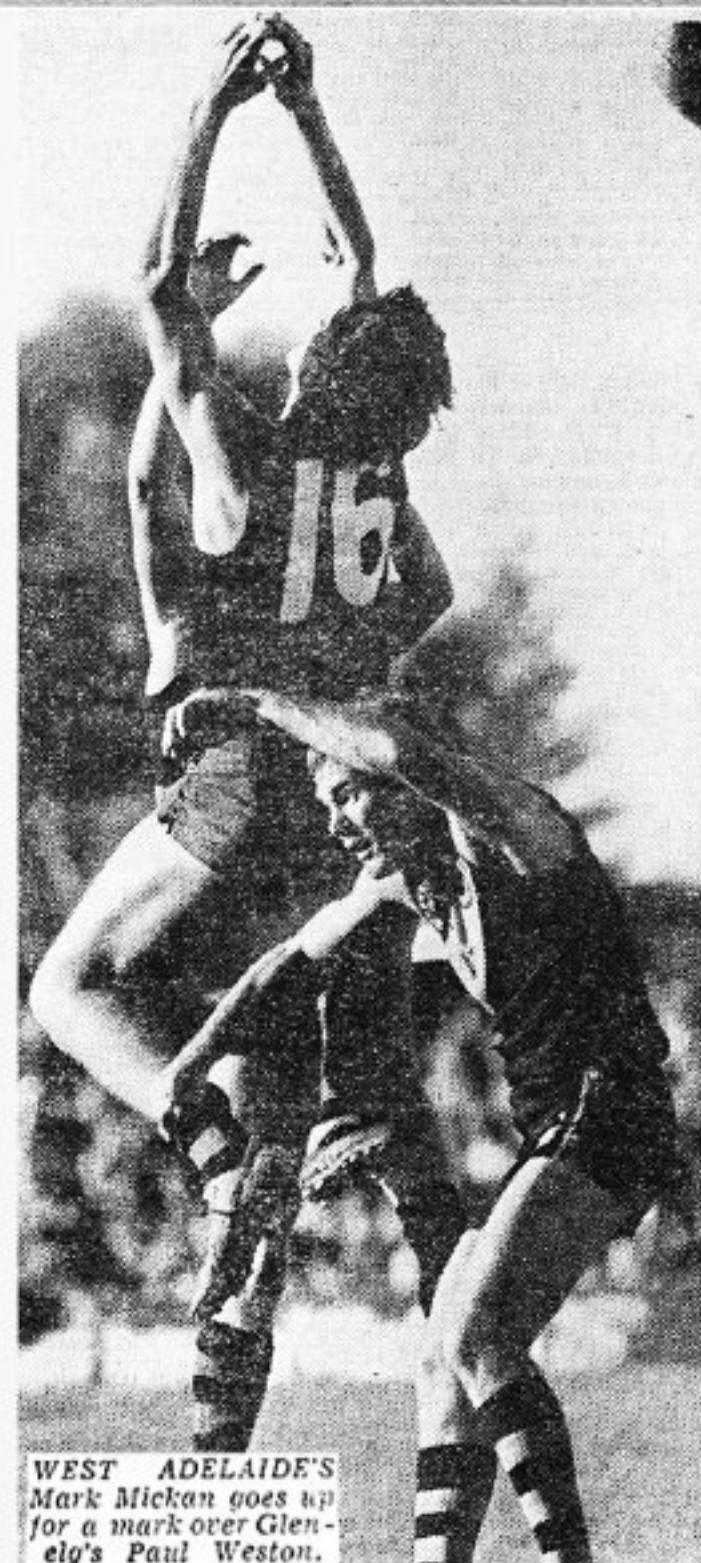
Sturt further consolidated its position at the top of the league ladder with a convincing win over South and Rick Davies ran riot with eight goals.

Centreman Russell Hutton wrenched his knee and was carried off on a stretcher, but the injury is not serious.

Central district delivered another blow to North after the Roosters looked to be in with a big chance at three-quarter time.

Michael Aish (shoulder) and Frank Stemper (dislocated finger) were the only minor casualties in Norwood's slender victory over Woodville.

Woodville, yet to taste victory this season, was in front until the 29-minute mark of the final quarter but the Redlegs eased out of their perilous position and the Peckers were denied yet again.

The massacre!

The confrontation between Glenelg and West Adelaide, after a week of tension and counter-claims, should have been one of the most exciting games of the minor round.

West reputedly had improved out of sight and dispatches from the Glenelg camp suggested coach John Halbert was finally going to give the Bays their full rein.

Only one story was correct and Glenelg can claim the glory.

The Bloods came to Glenelg Oval with justified notoriety, but in just two quarters of football they were fobbed off like cheeky imposters.

The Tigers mauled West in the first two quarters in an effort which left no hope for their demoralised opponents.

Counter

West mounted a minor counter-offensive in the third term, displaying some of the talents that had put it in second spot, but it was all in vain.

It simply did not have a consistent winner as Glenelg systematically stormed forward.

The trend was evident from the start with ruckman, lofty Stephen Kernahan claiming three early goals.



West managed to regain some ground later in the term, but it could not match the skilful way in which Glenelg carried the ball from its defence into attack.

But the second quarter was the killer for West.

Tiger rovers Tony McGuinness and John Paynter burst on to the scene to lead Glenelg on a relentless goal-hunt that left the bewildered Bloods in its wake.

At half time a huge 64 points separated the sides after every Glenelg player had contributed.

Apart from the rioting rovers McGuinness and Paynter, big Peter Carey was in devastating form; follower Chris McDermott refused to miss any of the action; Ralph Sewer was too elusive at centre; and former Norwood recruit Brenton Hartfield effectively used his bulk at centre half-forward.

After half-time West coach Neil Kerley tried wholesale changes.

But the Tigers made it quite clear early in the last quarter they were not going to relinquish any of the ascendancy they had worked so hard to gain in the first half.

They pounded home no less than 10 goals in the final 30-odd minutes as every player, most notably evergreen wingman John MacFarlane, mounted a new assault.

Glenelg coach John Halbert could not have been happier about the 122-point victory.

"It was a marvellous win," he said. "We can't be dissatisfied with that."
