North youngsters shine in thriller

Looking back on yesterday's hard fought clash at Glenelg Oval, both North and Glenelg could have counted themselves unlucky not to have grabbed the two premierships points.

Perhaps in the end it was North's persistence and downright doggedness which saw it win the day and take a well-deserved 10-point victory.

But so easily Glenelg coach Graham Campbell and those out in Tiger territory could have been celebrating the side's first win for the season.

The Roosters were courage personified to come from a 10-point deficit at three-quarter time to snatch a thrilling victory in a "topsy-turvy" last term.

Golden

It was goal-for-goal in the final 30-odd minutes and the Glenelg hierarchy is still no doubt lamenting some golden opportunities missed in front of goal.

North coach Michael Nunan was naturally a relieved and delighted man after earlier proceedings.

"We persisted all day and finally got the reward for our strong attack on the ball," Nunan said.

"And the performance of our younger players, especially Matthew Campbell on a wing and Andrew Jarman when he came on to the ground, shows we also have promising juniors."

For one so young, 18-year-old rookie wingman Campbell was superb.

Winner of the club's best and fairest in the under-19's last season, the tall, agile Campbell has played consistently well all season.

Yesterday he picked up 23 kicks, and four hand-balls and was the chief instigator in his team's win.

Craig Stanbridge at

centre half-back cut out the direct route to Glenelg's goal and set up many moves with some fine rebounding play.

Tony Antrobus was a creative rover all day and talented follower Greg McAdam was an inspiration around the ground with his attack on the ball.

David Tiller, particularly in the second half, won some important kicks and ruckman Mick Redden battled valiantly all day.

For Glenelg, it was a fine return to form by captain Peter Carey in ruck.

Suspension

For most of the year he has spent time in the forward pocket, with Stephen Kernahan taking over the rucking responsibilities.

But with Kernahan unavailable through suspension, Carey was back to his best on the ball, and showed little effect of a troublesome knee complaint.

Carey had a grand battle with Mick Redden, but was far superior around the ground, taking 10 strong marks.

Tony McGuinness was another highly creative player, and David Marshall in the centre, especially in the first three terms, rated highly.

Former North player Wayne Stringer tried hard all day and will improve as the season progresses.

The move of Daryl Rady into defence by coach Campbell proved a winner and he saved the Tigers on a number of occasions.

COACH ADMITS: TIGERS' BACKS TO THE WALL

A confidence shaken Glenelg is experiencing its worst start to a season for 36 years.

And a dejected coach Graham Campbell yesterday admitted the Tigers had their "backs to the wall."

After five rounds Glenelg has failed to win a match. Rarely has a grand finalist faded down the ladder so quickly.

Glenelg lost its first eight games in 1947 when it finished second to bottom.

In 1971 it won only one of its first seven games but finished sixth.

It was a scene of gloom in the Glenelg rooms after yesterday's 10-point loss to North Adelaide.

"We've definitely got our backs to the wall," Campbell said.

"It's sad, but it's true. Given a few breaks we should have won the game, but that's the way luck runs when you are losing."

"Campbell said Glenelg missed Stephen Kernahan who served a one-match suspension for striking Norwood's Garry McIntosh.

"We were let down by some poor kicking for goal and in the last term we also gave away too many free kicks in front of goal," he added.

However, Campbell was happy with the competitiveness his young Tigers showed.

"The players showed a lot of character to come back the way they did in the last quarter after being headed," he said.

In between Glenelg's run of losses was a heavy defeat to Geelong in the Sterling Cup.

The Tigers are languishing in ninth spot on the premierships table, two wins behind West Torrens and ahead of only Woodville on per-

centage.

Glenelg is concerned with David Holst who had stitches inserted in his head. It hopes to regain John MacFarlane and Tony Symonds for its next clash.

Glenelg meets West Torrens (Football Park), Woodville (Glenelg), South Adelaide (Adelaide) and Central District (Glenelg) in its next four matches to complete the first round.

Unless the Tigers win all four matches — and well — they will almost certainly miss the finals for only the fourth time in 17 years.

They have played in eight of the past 14 grand finals, including the past two, with their only success in 1973.

The possibility of not being close enough to be a chance again is obviously a concern to the club and its fickle supporters.

Meanwhile, Woodville also continued its losing run with a 37 point loss to Central District at Elizabeth.

But the difference this time was the Warriors' competitiveness, desire for the ball and aggression, compared with their shameful performance against North Adelaide the previous week.

The unbeaten Bloods would have to be thrashed almost beyond the realms of possibility to lose top spot as their percentage
