# Good intentions weren't enough

South 20-13, Glenelg 7-15

Yesterday's loss to South Adelaide was a sad indictment of Glenelg's side—despite all the best intentions in the world.

The Tigers could not get themselves off the floor to win their most important game of the season.

They could not win this one for Graham Campbell, the man sacked as coach mid-week and reinstated 24 hours later.

The Tigers simply were not good enough, despite a week of consolidation and great displays of unity from the players as they pledged total support for Campbell.

## Cracked

"I expected a better response after the week's happenings," Campbell said in the change-rooms after the game.

There was no question of the Tigers' determination, desire to win and aggressive attack on the ball for three quarters.

They showed immense courage, as did South, in every pack, and did their utmost for the club. But unfortunately, it was not good enough.

South's game was ade-

quate for three quarters, its defensive action extremely impressive for the entire game and its last quarter nothing short of magnificent.

The Panthers led by 23 points at three quarter-time and the Tigers were still in the match.

But South cracked Glenelg's defence within a minute of the bounce to start the final term with a John Schneebichler goal.

Darren Kappler followed this with his fourth goal less than a minute later. Schneebichler added another his fourth, as Glenelg's final hopes disappeared on the negligible Adelaide Oval breeze.

The expectation around the ground that the Tigers had something in reserve, something to give in the final term, was destroyed.

They had nothing, particularly up forward, where after that opening three-goal burst, and the they have big problems.

They folded in the quarter, through Ron Hateley, Graham Brooksby and Phillip Would, added another four goals, for a total of seven in 13 minutes.

Glenelg led the match until the 15-minute mark of the first term, when Darren Kappler kicked South's second goal.

But the Tigers looked shaky under the tremendous pressure applied by South's defence, led by coach Graham Cornes, and booted five successive points before Tony Symonds goaled at the 10-minute mark.

Two quick goals, from Schneebichler and Kappler, put the Panthers in front and they were never again threatened for the lead.

Cornes was anxious to win the game against his former club.

"I was concerned that what happened during the week would unite Glenelg with a common cause," Cornes said after the match.

"At the same time, I knew the match had to be won on the ground and our form has been better this year. Every player was aware of his obligation today."

## After a week of turmoil a 13-goal bloodbath

Where does Glenelg go from here? That is the question being seriously asked in SA football circles.

Where indeed? After yesterday's 13-goal drubbing by South Adelaide, up can be the only direction.

The Tigers have slumped to their worst start to a season since 1946-7.

It remains to be seen whether the record books will be re-written further but they have a long way to go to break their 1946 record.

Glenelg must find a forward capable of taking a mark and converting.

It is becoming too painfully obvious another forward is a must but equally important is the ability to put together a concerted on-field effort.

As coach Graham Campbell said after the match: "The attitude was right but attitude alone does not win football games."

## Threaten

In 1947 the Tigers lost their first eight games to South, North, West, Torrens, West, Sturt, Port, Norwood and North again, before defeating South, ironically the side that defeated them convincingly yesterday.

In 1946, Glenelg lost its first 14 games and it is not impossible it will threaten that record this season.

The Tigers meet in the next seven weeks:

●Central District at the Bay. The Bulldogs are coming back to full strength and have won four games.

●Port Adelaide at Alberton. The Magpies are the toughest nut to crack on their home ground.

●West at the Bay. The Bloods are having a great season and have won six matches.

●Norwood, the premier side, at the Bay.

●North at Prospect. The Roosters are another hard side to beat on their home ground.

To break that 14 straight loss record since 1946, West Torrens would have to defeat the Tigers at Thebarton which is possible, if not probable.

But through all the troubles of the week and his sacking, Campbell's commitment remains 100 per cent.

He was, in his own words, as "flat as a tack" after yesterday's debacle at Adelaide Oval.

He said after the game, that the encounter "had to show me that there was something there."

What is there is a total support from his players although he was sacked on Tuesday night — by the committee — and reinstated on Wednesday night.

## Endeavor

It was due largely to the entreaties of his players, that the club committee took the step of reinstating him.

"I thought the emotion of the week would have made the difference today," he said.

"I expected a better response to the week's happenings."

"I would have thought it would have happened today."

But Campbell was full of praise for the endeavor of his players, who fought out the game for three quarters.

Campbell's near premature departure from the club happened after seven games.

But in 1924, club coach F. Pincombe was sacked after two games at the helm.

Records supplied by football historian Ern Kolosche show Pincombe took over as coach in 1924 and led the Tigers to a loss in the first and second games of the year. He was sacked after the second, although to that stage Glenelg had not won a match since joining the league in 1921.
