Good intentions weren't enough

South 20-13, Glenelg 7-15

Yesterday's loss to South Adelaide was a sad indictment of Glenelg's side—despite all the best intentions in the world.

The Tigers could not get themselves off the floor to win their most important game of the season.

They could not win this one for Graham Campbell, the man sacked as coach mid-week and reinstated 24 hours later.

The Tigers simply were not good enough, despite a week of consolidation and great displays of unity from the players as they pledged total support for Campbell.

Cracked

"I expected a better response after the week's happenings," Campbell said in the change-rooms after the game.

There was no question of the Tigers' determination, desire to win and aggressive attack on the ball for three quarters.

They showed immense courage, as did South, in every pack, and did their utmost for the club. But unfortunately, it was not good enough.

South's game was ade-

quate for three quarters, its defensive action extremely impressive for the entire game and its last quarter nothing short of magnificent.

The Panthers led by 23 points at three quartertime and the Tigers were still in the match.

cracked But South Glenelg's defence within a minute of the bounce to start the final term with a John Schneebichler goal. Darren Kappler followed

this with his fourth goal less than a minute later. Schneebichler added another his fourth, as Glenelg's final hopes disappeared on the negligible Adelaide Oval breeze.

"At the same time, I knew the match had to be won on the ground and our form has been better this year. Every player was aware of his obligation today."

Where does Glenelg go from here? That is the question being seriously asked in SA football circles.

Where indeed? After yesterday's 13goal drubbing by South Adelaide, up can be the only direction.

The Tigers have slumped to their worst start to a season since 1946-7.

It remains to be seen whether the record books will be re-written further but they have a long way to go to break their 1946 record.

It is becoming too painfully obvious another forward is a must but equally important is the ability to put together a concerted onfit'd effort.

As coach Graham Campbell said after the match: "The attitude was right but attitude alone does not win football games."

Threaten

In 1947 the Tigers lost their first eight games to South, North, West Torrens, West, Sturt, Port, Norwood and North again, before defeating South, ironically the side that defeated them convincingly yesterday.

In 1946, Glenelg lost its first 14 games and it is not impossible it will threaten that record this season.

But through all the troubles of the week and his sacking, Campbell's commitment remains 100 per cent.

He was, in his own words, as "flat as a tack" after yesterday's debacle at Adelaide Oval.
