

We deserve it, declares triumphant Campbell

THE Tigers have leaped into top spot for the first time in three seasons and are roaring following yesterday's crushing victory over Central District at Football Park.

And an ecstatic coach Graham Campbell immediately launched an attack on the critics who doubted whether Glencig could handle the pressure.

"We have not played a bad game this scason. We are top and we deserve to be there, its simple arithmetic," he declared.

But in the next changeroom, the scene resembled a wake as Central coach Kevin Neale conceded it was the Bulldogs' worst result this season.

It saw them plummet to fourth position behind South Adelaido on percentage, and raised doubts

whether they would really be a threat in the major round.

"I thought we looked beaten atter 10 minutes of play. They made their minds up halfway through the first quarter they were tired and could not contest," Neale said.

"We had worked hard at training, the feeling before the game was good, yet we went out there down in spirit and confidence."

Surprisingly, the atmosphere was subdued at Unley after Sturt caused an upset by beating Norwood by eight points, ending the Blues' shocking losing run.

Norwood coach Neil Balme was naturally angry and puzzled at the loss, but the Redlegs should still make the finals.

They are two wins ahead of West Adelaide with three rounds remaining, Norwood plays West, North and South, while the Bloods meet Norwood, South and Sturt.

Torrens beat Woodville by 28 points in a disappointing game. Torrens ruckman Jeff Sarau was reported by field umpire Daryl Schramm for allegedly striking an unamed Woodville player with his right elbow during the final

Sarau was one of the Eagles' best in his comeback after missing four matches with a broken collarbone.

Gleneig could rest Stephen Copping for a couple of weeks. He has been carrying a groin injury for some weeks, Campbell said the club would review his situation during the week.

Looking at the next round, the blg showdown will be between Glenelg and South at the Bay. The Panthers looked as if they had little hope of gaining a double chance a few weeks back, but they would be a contender for the minor premlership if they beat Gleneig.

Only one victory and percentage separates the top four sides, and of them, Port Adelaide appears to have the best draw as it plays Woodville, Sturt, and Torrens.
