

But an even happier man because of a return to from by his side should be South Adelaide coach Graham Cornes after his team beat Glenelg by 23 points at Football Park.


It was a tremendous effort by the disciplined Panthers who were up against a side brimming with confidence after tossing Sturt the previous round.
