'WE'RE ON THE WAY BACK'

North Adelaide coach Mike Nunan Is hoping his side has turned the winning corner following his side's incredible last quarter effort against Central District at Prospect yesterday.

The Roosters were down 12 goals at the last change, and then slammed on 8-2 while holding the Bulldogs scoreless.

The goals burst was not eonugh, as North still lost by 22 points, but Nunan said the last term performance showed plenty of promise.


