 Woodville topple West Adelaide by 25 points, with coach Malcolm Blight kicking eight goals to increase his lead on the goalkicking list.

 Norwood end North Adeliade's unbeaten run, winning by 36 points and strengthening its grip on second spot.

•West Torrens win by one point against Glenelg with a last minute goal from Kym Dillon, sending the Eagles back into third spot, and jeopardising the Tigers' place in the five.

 Central District break away from Port Adelaide to win by 33 points and place it within percentage of the five.

Norwood coach Neil Balme shuffled his side before the match and wa snot surprised by the great victory.


