Ebert: We still can make finals

Port Adelaide coach Russell Ebert believes the Magpies may still steal a place in the final five.

"We've still got a chance — we've just got to keep on winning," he said after Port thrashed West Torrens by 110 points in their game at Alberton Oval.

It was the Magpies' third successive win.

They are now two games out of the five with four minor round matches to come.

"It was a good win," Ebert said.

"Our last three quarters were as good as we've played all year."

In their next four games, the Magpies play Glenelg at Alberton, Sturt at Alberton, Central at Football Park and Norwood at Football Park.

They would need to win all those games — a tough prospect — while relying on both Central and more importantly, West Adelaide, to stumble.

For West Torrens coach Glenn Elliott and his side, it was six losses in a row.

It now has a battle on its hands to avoid the wooden spoon.

"I really haven't got any answer," Elliott said.

"We've just got to keep on working and concentrate on the basics."

Stringer, Kennedy on mat

GLENELG centreman Alan Stringer and Port Adelaide wingman Arlen Kennedy will face the league tribunal on Tuesday night after being reported yesterday.

Stringer had his number taken by field umpire Steve Semmler for allegedly striking North rover Tony Antrobus during the second quarter.

Kennedy was reported by field umpire Graham Hilton for allegedly striking an unnamed Torrens player during the first term.

Warriors' record spree

Woodville's shock win over Norwood at Woodville was its first victory over the Redlegs for six years.

The Warriors last tasted success at Norwood on August 4, 1979, when they won narrowly.

Yesterday's 53-point winning margin was Woodville's biggest against the Redlegs and its 24-16 was its biggest winning score against Norwood.

The Warriors 10-3 second quarter was its best quarter score against Norwood and captain-coach Malcolm Blight's eight goals was a record against the reigning premier.

But the Redlegs created their own record — 16-11 was their highest losing score against the bottom side.

Bays set for double chance

Glenelg jumped into third place with its fourth successive win when it defeated top-placed North Adelaide at Prospect Oval yesterday.

On recent form it's hard to see the Bays missing the vital finals' double chance.

Their fourth successive win gave the Roosters their fourth successive loss.

... yet while the signs were good for Glenelg's finals hopes there also were some good signs for North.

The Roosters retained their three-point advantage at the head of the table, courtesy of Woodville's stunning 53-point win against Norwood.

And their improvement, after losses to Sturt (30 points), South (six points) and West (100 points), was obvious.

Heartened

They showed, in patches, some of the spark that had set them alight this season and had helped them to 11 successive wins.

Four successive losses for a top side at this time of year might normally be cause for grave concern for a coach, but North's Mike Nunan had reason to be heartened by the way his injury-riddled side remained in the hunt until midway through the final quarter.

And Nunan is hopeful that five of the injured at North could return for next week's clash against Cen-

tral District.

David Robertson (back), Trevor Hill (hamstring), Matthew Campbell (back), Brenton Phillips (ankle) and Darel Hart (pneumonia) may be available for selection next week.

And defender Trevor Clisby (knee) also is hopeful of returning before the finals.

So North Adelaide's slump has not reached a point of desperation.

Hopeful

But Glenelg's successive wins against South, Central, Woodville and the Roosters to reverse a worrying slump which saw it win just two of eight games, will have left its supporters hopeful that better is to come.

Yesterday it overcame a scintillating start by North, and in particular Tony Antrobus, and a determined fightback by it late in the third and early in the final quarters, to claim the all-important victory.

The Bays did so with a solid, all-round team effort. But while it was a reasonably even performance, one player did stand out as best afield.

He was follower Peter Maynard, who continually charged in and won the hard ball and drove the Tigers into attack.

Maynard, after finally overcoming a serious ankle injury that he has struggled with since 1983, started the season in the reserves.

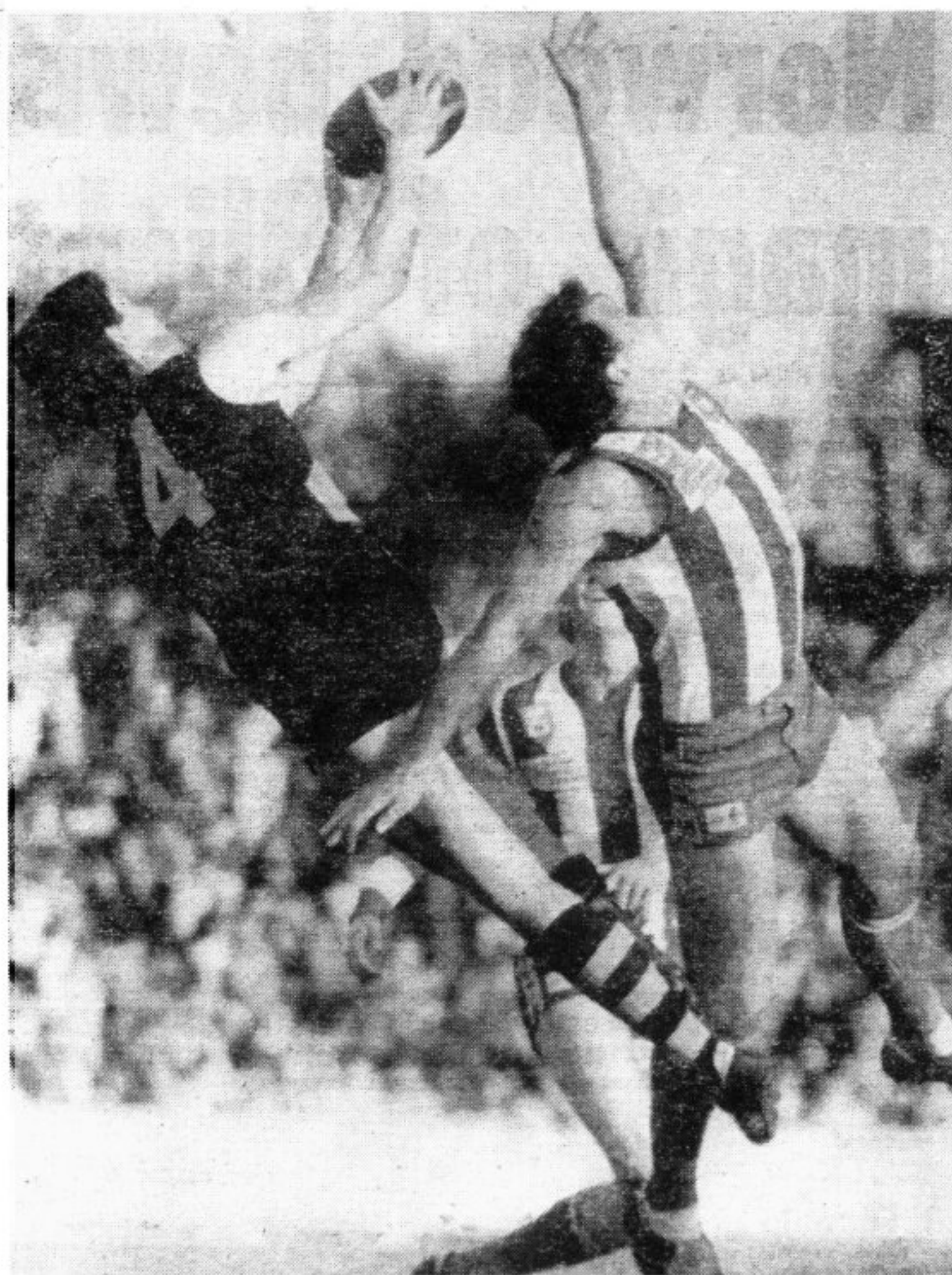
But the former Melbourne player has played some outstanding games since being back in the league side. None probably more so than yesterday when he picked up 23 kicks, eight marks, 11 handballs and booted three goals.

Bay centre half-forward Stephen Kernahan was contained early on by North's Steven Hay, but Kernahan is a player who simply cannot be held down for a full game.

The longer the game went, the greater was his impact, and he pulled down 12 towering marks and kicked four goals.

David Marshall, in his second league game since returning from a bad hand injury, showed glimpses of his best form, and wingman Tony Symonds, who booted the goal of the day with a superb left foot shot in the third quarter, won many kicks.

North's best was possibly captain David Tiller, who repeatedly drove the Roosters forward with his long left-footed kicks.
