

BACK BOUNCE THE LEGS!

Resilient Norwood stormed back into the premiership limelight while other finals contenders North and Sturt crashed in yesterday's nineteenth round.

And the Redlegs unveiled "secret weapon" Des O'Dwyer who stunned with a strong marking 10-goal haul from full forward against disappointing Sturt at Football Park.



— 'Super' soars into the 350-club-

Glenelg's Peter Carey, giant among SA's footy glants, will become just the fourth SA player to reach the 350 club game milestone on Saturday.

Carey, 31, will follow in the footsteps of Russell Ebert (Port, 389 games), Graham Cornes (364 games — Glenelg 317, South 47), and Paul Bagshaw (Sturt, 360 games).

And on Saturday, two
of those 350-game
champions, Cornes and
Ebert, will be opposing
coaches as Carey
reaches his milestone in
the Glenelg-Port clash
at Alberton.

It was 15 years ago a 17-year-old Seacombe High School student faced State ruckman Dean Farnham in his league debut against Central District at Elizabeth.

Now Peter Carey has an imposing list of achievements to his name.

Success

 Best and fairest for Glenelg in 1975, '79 and'81.

The Tigers' leading goalscorer in 1973 with 70 when he was dominant in their premiership success.

•Seventeen games for SA and an All-Australian in 1979 and 1980.

Fos Williams Medallist for SA's best against WA in 1981 and Bay captain for the past three seasons.

Now, 349 games and 462 goals later, Carey recalls: "It's been a long time."

Carey was shocked by his inclusion in the league side for the first time in 1971, for the round 12 game against the Bulldogs.

"It all happened pretty quickly. I received a phone call from the team manager on the Thursday



night at 9.30," Carey said.

"I had only trained with the league side for half an hour on that night. And that was the first time I had had any contact with the league players.

"I didn't know any of the league players, so I hitched a ride to the ground with one of the reserves players and got there at 10 o'clock."

Carey is uncertain what the future holds for his playing career, but still has a burning ambition to captain a Glenelg premiership side and repeat the grand final success of 1973.

"I'm taking it year by year now. I'll have a look at my future at the end of the season, I'm still enjoying it immensely, but training is a big commitment.

Thrill

"I'll sit down with my family and have a chat with Cornsey. The boys (sons Matthew, seven, and Justin, five) are growing up fast and they wouldn't mind seeing dad once in a while.

"But I still get a big thrill out of playing and competing. They're a tremendous bunch of lads at Gleneig."

Carey believes his first league coach, Nell Kerley, had a major influence on his career.

"I suppose your first coach at that level usually leaves the biggest impression, but I have tremendous respect for Nell. "He was always an inspiration.

"He placed fairly heavy demands on your performances on the field, but he was a very good motivator. And he had confidence in me and that certainly helped."

Kerley's confidence in Carey was well placed.

In the 1973 grand final win against North Adelaide, "Super" was dominant, collecting 19 kicks, grabbing 12 marks and booting six goals from centre halfforward.

The Bays won the final by seven points after North had snatched the lead in the late stages.

"That was the game I most remember. It was tremendous. It was close all day and a great standard.

"I remember at the 30 minute mark when North hit the front. I looked around the field and saw everyone hanging their heads.

"We were physically gone and expecting the siren to go at any minute but were just able to give that last brave effort."

Cornes was the hero in the closing minutes when he soared above the pack to grab a remarkable mark, then kicked the goal that returned the lead to Glenelg.

Respect

"On Saturday night some friends came around and they wanted to watch the game so we were looking at the video at 2 o'clock in the morning," Carey said.

Now Cornes is Carey's coach.

"After playing on the same team as him for 13 years, it was a bit hard to adjust to him being coach. Our relationship is now on a different basis, but we have a mutual respect."

Five losing grand finals (in 1974, '75, '77, '81, '82) have been a disappointment for the great ruckman. The most disappoining was the 1975 loss to Norwood — a premiership that slipped away.

"A lot of people have canned us for our grand final record. But a number of those finals we did a tremendous job just to reach after being written off earlier," he says.


Carey's greatest ruck adversary in SA during his career has been former Sturt captain and now South coach Rick Davies.

"Davies was a phenomenal player at his peak. He was the toughest I have played against in SA. Then there were the Victorians — Mark Lee, Garry Dempsey, Peter Moore — they were pretty tough."

Carey does not particularly regret not having played in the VFL.

"If I was 19 now, it might be different but it wasn't such a big deal to play in Victoria when I was young."

'Most skilled big man'




CAREY circa 1971 . . . a Seacombe High student

"He has really had no lapses in form, apart from a few games this season, since starting in league football, and to maintain that consistency over such a long period of time is remarkable," Cornes said.

"His enthusiasm for the game is still there, and he combines that with a real maturity and football brain.

"He is one of the thinkers of football and can always be relied upon for a precise, accurate analysis of the situation."
