Tigers seal double chance and . . .

STURT IN HOT SEAT

Sturt has taken over the SA National Football League's hotseat following its disgraceful showing against Port Adelaide yesterday.

The Blues suffered the disaster of dropping to fifth spot on the premiership table as a result of its shock 49-point drub-

It was Sturt's third loss in succession, and helps pave the way for Central District "steal" fifth spot from the Blues.

Central meets Port and West in the finals count-

It was a big day for West, Glenelg and North as their premiership aspirations rocketed upwards.

West recorded a 77point win against South and climbed from fifth to fourth spot on the premiership table.

Gleneig scaled a double chance in the finals with an inspiring win over premiers Norwood by 40 points, and North ended five-game losing streak by holding on for a nine-point win against Torrens.

Glenelg's win was in a real pressure match, and must have given great heart to coach Graham Cornes.

"We were not competitive enough and our mistake level is at an unacceptable stage." Keane said.

"We now have to go back to the basic principles.

"It's no good hitting the panic button, there just has to be some honest appraisals done and we have to turn the tables in the next two games.

"If we win our next two games we will be in the finals — it's as simple as that."

No nonsense Bays double mood

The Tigers have again leapt into premiership contentions but few would have realised judging from the relatively subdued atmosphere in the changerooms after they gallantly beat Norwood at Football Park yesterday.

Their reaction was similar to their on-field approach - no nonsense. just plain hard work and a magnificent team effort.

And coach Graham Cornes made no bold statements or predictions about Glenelg's finals chances despite tossing the reigning premier.

So what did the Tigers achieve besides the two premiership points?

Plenty. They secured a double chance in the major round and once again proved they are capable of performing under pressure.

Brilliance

Norwood, to its credit, made it a tough contest and there was no room for any fancy play.

And Glenelg not only resisted the fierce tackles. broke clear of the bustling packs and withstood fine third quarter comeback by Norwood, they poured on their brilliance with a nine-goal last term.

This team of Tigers is different from some of those of the past — they can live up to their tenacious. slogan as Rarely has a Glenelg side played with such ferocity and certainly with such desire for the hard ball.

The statistics will show the teams recorded about the same number of disposals, but the real difference was that Glenelg had 42 more kicks.

While Norwood sisted with handballs, at times slowing the play and allowing Glenelg to make position, the Tigers kicked with confidence.

Effective

When the ball soared, there were players of the calibre of Stephen Kernahan, Stephen Copping, Tony Hall and Chris Mc-Dermott to take the marks.

And when the marks were not taken, there was a pack of Tigers ready to pounce and clear the ball ball away with either a dash of an effective disposal.

Glenelg slaughtered Norwood moving out of the centre square through Peter Carey, Peter Maynard, McDermott and especially Tony McGuinness.

McGuinness is perhaps the typical example of the change in approach which has descended upon Glenelg.

Without being unkind, his game once revolved on scouting the packs and displaying tremendous dash. But yesterday, as he has done all season, he showed courage "unfriendly" the packs and won the hard ball.

And he bolstered this feature of his game with sprint, excellent teamwork, and the miracle goals which lifted his side.

The lead changed 10 times before Glenelg fully asserted its authority and ran away comfortable

Norwood got off to a tardy start by kicking 2-7 with the wind and from then on had to struggle

to remain in contention. It was rarely allowed to take grasp of the match, even though it led at three-quarter time by a goal after a five-goal re-

vival.

Sure, Norwood was unlucky to hit the post twice in the first term. and it has had stars on the injured list including Neville Roberts, Hall, Duncan Fosdike and Justin Scanlon to mention a few.

But it was outclassed over four demanding quarters when they lined up man-for-man yester-

It had few players who gave top performances over four quarters. The best was centreman Garry McIntosh, but his efforts were so often to no avail because of the resilient Glenelg defence.

Bruce Winter played well in defence and snared two goals when he drifted from his back pocket and caught Glenelg unaware.

Cornes combated this by having Ress Gibbs as a loose man in defence when kicking against the . restricting wind and Winter's free movement.

Gibbs was one of many who excelled for the Tigers. He was damaging in defence, on the ball, and later in a forward pocket.

Norwood: led until the six minute mark of the last term and then up jumped the champ -Stephen Kernahan and he booted a goal.

It was one of 11 fine marks he took, but more importantly, he used the ball effectively after each

Hall in defence, Tony Symonds on a wing, Copping in the forward lines . . . no matter where you looked Glenelg had winners. It was a different story with Norwood.
