Glenelg yesterday took top position on the SANFL ladder from North Adelaide—and the scene now is set for a magnificent last round.

The top six places on the premiership table could alter next Saturday and Central District is still a chance to compete in the elimination final.

North Adelaide yesterday lost its sixth match in seven weeks - to a powerful Norwood by 87 points - and have dropped to second spot after heading the table since round two.

And Rooster coach Mike Nunan was bitterly disappointed with his players' effort, declaring:

"We weren't good enough and Norwood wanted to win more than us.

In fact, he was more interested in my health rather than the result or his better players, so one can only imagine that his times of disappointment have mellowed his expectations.


