Dejected West coach laments: HAVE HIT ROCK

While North Adeiaide remains unbeaten as the league leader after a 20point win against Glenelg at the Bay, West Adelaide's defeat at the hands of Sturt at Richmond moved a dejected coach John Cahill to say the Bloods had hit "rock bottom."

"I have never seen so many name players out of touch-and for two or three weeks," he lamented in the West dressing rooms after the game,

champion slipping to its third successive defeat-and to eighth position on the premiership table.

"There's just a total lack of confidence," he said.

In the adjoining Sturt rooms, there was good reason for celebration. The Blues had broken a long-standing hoodoo at the Richmond Oval, winning their first game there since 1974,

Indeed, the final score-a 35point margin to the Blues-dld not reflect their dominance. More so the 37 scoring shots they had, compared with West's 22.

"I've probably never put in more hours' work, with so little to show for it" Cah.ll said of the time spent pouring, over videos of recent games and of meetings held with his co-selectors.

"There is a lack of commitment. Players are looking around to see who is around them and not going in for the ball and messing about with it rather than playing direct, whiple football.

"We just have to work harder."

While West's third successive loss was source of concern for Cahill, the Blues' third successive win showed Sturt was back as a

But next week Sturt faces its biggest test - against unbeaten North Adelaide at Unley.

North again showed it was a worthy competition pacesetter with a convincing win against Gleneig. Coach Mike Nunan said: "There is a degree of football maturity in the club now.

"The players approach was very good. They were very disciplined."

At Football Park Norwood had to struggle before finally overcoming a persistent Woodville by 23 points.



The Tigers had everything going for them. They were kicking with the use of a strong breeze, most of the crowd were cheering for them, and they had the bounce of the ball going their way.


In the face of this, North showed it has arrived as a power.
