3 BOOKED IN ACTION ROUND

A draw, three reports, a sensational comeback by West Torrens, and magnificent turnarounds by last year's grand finalists, Glenelg and North Adelaide.

That was the start of round 10 which will be completed tomorrow when Sturt and Port Adelaide fight for a spot in the five.

But it was the Tigers who caused the greatest ripple when they tossed Norwood at the Parade by 12 points, ensuring the fight for finals berths is well from over.

They have remained in seventh spot and still need to catch up at least three wins, but their revival after being thrashed last week suggests they have returned as a force.

Coach Graham Cornes, however, has not got carried away with the victory over Norwood.

"We got what we came for... the two premierships points," he said.

"I was pleased with the manner with which the players responded to this vital encounter."

There were three reports from yesterday's matches. Craig Braddy (Central) by goal umpire

Des Hillebrand for allegedly striking Darren Kappler (South); Steve Rendell (Torrens) by field umpire Mark Mackie for allegedly striking Andrew Taylor (Woodville); and Craig Balme (Norwood)

for allegedly striking John Seebohm (Glenelg) by field umpire Steve Semmler.

North defied the sceptics and made nonsense of the theory it was "exhausted and mentally flat" by beating West by 24 points.

The Roosters have shot two wins clear on the premierships table and regained their pride after losing badly to Hawthorn on Tuesday.

Central District came from eight points behind to force a draw with South Adelaide, but the Bulldogs still leapt into the five. The result paid \$63.80 on "Pottybet."

Woodville replaced Torrens on the bottom of the ladder when it lost by 24 points at Thebarton after the Eagles trailed by 32 points midway through the third term.

TIGERS BACK WITH A GROWL

In a rugged no-holds barred encounter which went the full distance at Norwood Oval, Glenelg yesterday outslugged Norwood for a 12-point victory which made a mockery of 'form.'

LEGS 'OUTSLUGGED'

In simple terms, the Tigers were more desperate than the home team and played the sort of football that one expects in September rather than June.

In recent weeks the Tigers have fallen from grace and the importance of this contest had no doubt been rammed down the throats of the players in the heavy training sessions during the week.

The planning had been meticulous, with coach Graham Cornes leaving Denis Marshall and Craig Woodlands on the bench to give the team fresh legs in the vital last quarter.

Spiteful

It was a wise decision, as the game was played at breakneck speed with a much higher-than-usual ratio of body clashes that would have sapped the energy of the combatants.

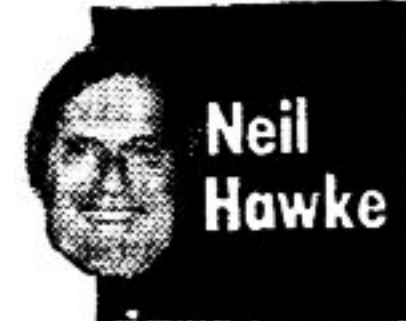
Michael Taylor, playing his 250th game for the Redlegs, lost the toss and although the game also was lost, it was through no fault of the evergreen and versatile player who finished at centre half-forward after starting in defence.

In a spiteful first term, Norwood rode the initial Tiger onslaught to kick three of the first four goals and looked impressive kicking into a fresh breeze.

The Stringer brothers engaged in some hostilities behind play with Tom Warhurst and this carried over into a full-blooded frontal assault on Warhurst after he had marked a ball in front of the members stand.

Not surprisingly, an ugly situation developed and took some time to sort out, but despite much huffing and puffing there were no reports and the game eventually re-started.

Warhurst eventually departed to hospital and Norwood, with its balance clearly affected, yielded

the advantage to Glenelg, which posted goals from Henwood, Wayne Stringer and Hall to take a lead it did not surrender.

It was a good game of football and at the risk of being labelled chauvinistic, definitely not one for the girls.

The Tigers, fed by a heavy dose of Carey commitment, had plenty of players prepared to risk their bodies in getting the ball out of packs, smothering off the boot, tapping off the ground to teammates, or knocking forward.

It was intestinal fortitude that Norwood could not or simply would not match.

Focal point

The Redlegs blew hot and cold and it was difficult to find a player who was in the game for the four quarters.

Pearce, in the early part, gave his teammates a focal point of attack, but was cut out of the game and finished at centre half-back.

Kelly, who replaced him at full forward, played a prominent role in the last quarter resurgence after a quiet beginning and this was indicative of the Norwood performance overall.

Keith Thomas and Michael Aish, who labored under the close attention of Scott Salisbury, suffered in comparison with the ball-getting exploits of Peter Maynard and Phillip Reid, who won many touches.

Steve Copping is steadily regaining touch in front of goals, but there is little doubt that goals are much harder to come by since the departure of Stephen Kernahan and Tony McGuinness.

It must be a particularly worrying time for Neil Balme as he ponders the Redlegs' performance.

With Glenelg well down in form and confidence, it was a great chance to grab a huge psychological advantage and perhaps deliver a lethal blow to the Tigers' aspirations of consecutive premierships.

Norwood miffed that chance and has given the hibernating Tigers a chance to wipe the sleep from their eyes and get back into the title race.

Little wonder that Cornes allowed himself the luxury of a smile.

He had used the situation as a motivating factor, watched his players respond to the clarion call and taken away the two points he had gone to collect.

It was never going to be an easy contest to win, but it was the manner of the win that pleased the Bay camp.

Mistakes

Norwood did not have an easy kick all day and under the pressure that was applied, it was little wonder that mistakes were made for which they paid dearly.

The home team will remember Taylor's milestone, the youthful maturity of Jamie Pyke, the polished experience of Phil Gallagher and the fine marking of Neil Hein.

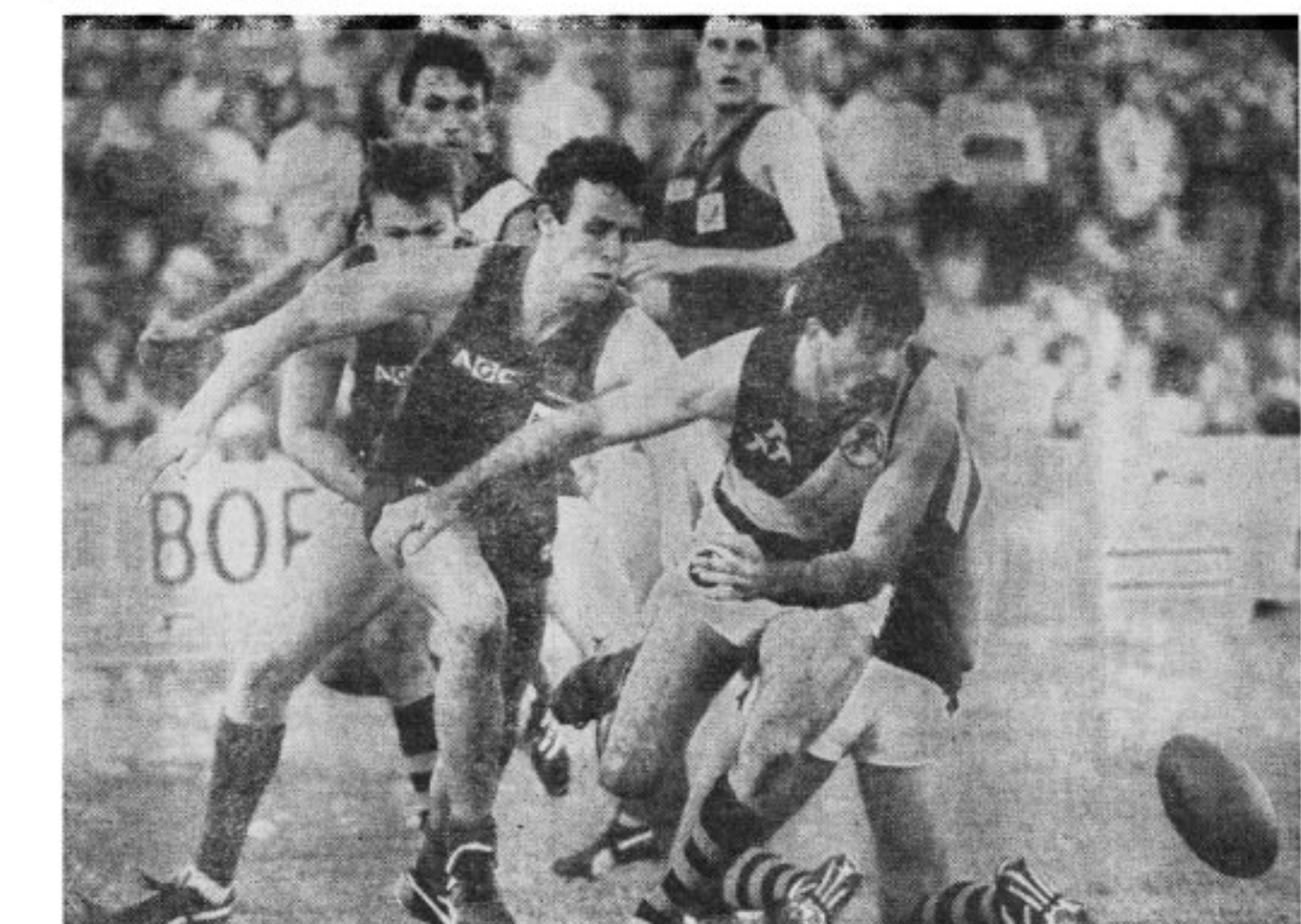
For his part, the Norwood club doctor will remember the blow that sent Tom Warhurst to hospital.

One sensed the doctor was ready to call for a lynching party to deal with the offending Glenelg player.

Many feel that the reported Craig Balme should have had company when presenting himself to League Commissioner, Mr Brian Martin on Tuesday night — and I am inclined to agree with them.
