

It was a wise decision, as the game was played at breakneck speed with much higher-thanusual ratio of body clashes that would have sapped the energy of the combatants.



Mistakes


Norwood did not have an easy kick all day and under the pressure that was applied, it was little wonder that mistakes were made for which they paid dearly.
