BOILOVER AND FINALS OPEN WIDER

Struggling Woodville yesterday forced the boilover of the season with a stunning 101-point demolition of glamor side Central District at Football Park.

And after yesterday's half-way mark of the minor round, only league leader North Adelaide is certain to finish in the top three.

And just two wins separate second-placed Norwood and seventh club Port Adelaide in a spectacularly open rush for finals berths in the next 11 rounds.

Injuries to key players Michael Aish (Norwood), Darren Troy (South), Peter Maynard (Glenelg) . . . Norwood's effortless victory over Sturt . . . West's Houdini win over South . . . and Glenelg's "turned-the-corner" win against Port . . . were other highlights.

But the glory of round 11 belongs to the rampaging Warriors, who outscored the Bulldogs by 13 goals in the second half to notch a near record winning margin and highest score in its 22 years of league competition.

Woodville courageously defied all the odds and experts to win so overwhelmingly after having lost its past five games by an average 47 points.

The amazing turnaround in form against Central, which had won four successive games and tied the next, will be one of football's 1986 highlights.

The spectacular victory, with rover Kevin Harris a seven-goal hero, is certain to quash speculation Woodville should amalgamate to avoid being football's perennial wooden spooners.

The Warriors jumped from bottom to eighth and only 11 wins out of the top five.

BAYS BACK IN RACE FOR FINALS BERTH

Glenelg is back in the race for a final five berth!

The Bays signalled that warning loud and clear at Alberton Oval yesterday, where they snatched a heart-stopping nine-point win against Port Adelaide.

Glenelg took home the two valuable premierships points with a 13-14 to 12-11 victory.

Just two weeks ago the reigning premier was in danger of becoming an also-ran — having won just three times from nine matches.

But successive wins against Norwood and Port have pushed the Bays into sixth spot on the table, just half a game out of the top five.

In those same two weeks Port has lost to Sturt and Glenelg and slipped from fifth to seventh position.

But the Magpies, who also are half a game behind Central, really only faltered for one term yesterday. That was all it needed to throw away the match.

Port posted 6-3 to 3-3 in the first term but allowed Glenelg back in during the next 25 minutes and was forced to play catch-up football.

"Our first quarter was very disappointing while Port was more desperate and more committed,"

"But when we warmed to the task we looked good."

"In the end, the game could have gone either way but, fortunately, I thought we maintained our composure and used the ball better in the final term."

It was a game we had the ability to win — and we did win.

"If we play to our ability we should be able to beat any side."

Glenelg's ability was severely tested in the final term.

It started with a lead of three points; after four minutes Port led by four points; after 10 minutes Glenelg was back in front by eight; nine minutes later Port was five clear; then two late goals from Tony Hall provided the spark for a sensational Bay triumph.

Hall was getting better and better as the day wore on.

He finished with 19 kicks, 14 marks, 11 handballs and booted three goals.

The Bulldogs' bubble has burst with a bang heard throughout SA and the club is faced with serious soul searching to explain a loss that has embarrassed coach Kevin Neale.

Neale left Football Park in disgust almost immediately after the first of the double-header games.

Central is still fifth, but blew the chance to consolidate a place amongst the football powerbrokers and press for a top three spot.

The Redlegs reacted strongly to their surprise loss to the Tigers last week and raised doubts about the future of the Blues as a genuine force.

The Bloods stole a two-point victory over the Panthers in the final 30 seconds at Richmond with two goals from half-forward Craig Burton in the last two minutes.

Anr Glenelg has finally turned the corner after beating the Magpies by nine points at Alberton.

That win, coupled with the Norwood triumph, means the reigning premier is sixth and only half a win out of the five.

Aish suffered a shoulder injury, Troy a strained left hamstring and Maynard a hip complaint.

Some doubts exist about those stars playing next week.

Defender Ross Gibbs was superb, rover Chris McDermott was always in the thick of things and captain Peter Carey was an inspiration to his side.

Both teams turned on an aggressive man-to-man struggle but many Port players blemished their performance with a disappointing second term.

The side amassed just 37 kicks for the quarter — with rover Tim Ginever picking up eight of those.

Two players who gave everything throughout the match were defender John Harvey and captain-ruckman Russell Johnston.

Harvey hardly put a foot wrong all day while Johnston led by example with 13 kicks, 15 marks, 17 hit-outs, 17 handballs and one goal.

Ginever, Darryl Borlase and Michael O'Brien also had starring roles.

"The second quarter was where we let Glenelg back into the game because we dropped our work rate," said Port coach Russell Ebert.

"You just can't afford to relax in any game."

"When you're three goals up you should want to be four, then five."

"But we did relax, Glenelg got in front and from there it was very difficult to peg them back."
