## CHARGE OF THE BLIGHT BRIGADE

Courageous Woodville continued a devastating charge to its first finals series in seven years with a pressure win over Port Adelaide at Woodville yesterday.

The Warriors are still sixth but only percentage out of the five and only one win from third position with four minor round games left.

Woodville coach Malcolm Blight played down his club's chances of contesting the major round and the grand final.

"There are still four games to go and anything can happen," Blight said.

"But yes, it was a top win."

The Warriors have won their past four matches - equalling the club's consecutive win record - but more importantly have now won seven of their past eight clashes.

Victory was only their second against the Magpies at Woodville in 22 years.

And it was achieved before a record crowd of 10,200.

Defeat ended Port's four-game winning run.

Sturt continued its poor form with its sixth consecutive loss.

## BLOODS DOWN, AND THEY COULD BE OUT

Statistically West Adelaide still could make the top five despite its 35-point loss against Glenelg at Football Park yesterday.

But the seventh-placed Bloods, who are two games behind fifth side Port, would have to show a remarkable improvement in the remaining four rounds to have any chance at all.

They have lost seven of their last nine matches and yesterday were only kept in the game for so long because of Glenelg's inaccuracy in front of goal.

The Bays won 13-25 to 10-8, but the number of scoring shots - 38 to 18 - probably gave a better indication of the game.

Glenelg had a total of 54 more kicks, 29 more marks and 48 more handballs for the game - and it had many more contributors.

The Bloods' coach, John Cahill, said after West's defeat: "There are too many players with reputations who are not getting the ball."

"And some players have to contest the ball harder."

"The attitude before the game was really good. The players knew it was dire straights."

"But once the pressure was applied we didn't have a match-winner who could take over."

In fact hardly any Bloods players could get into the game at all.

Peter Carey gave a "super" performance against one of West's most important players, captain Mark Mickan. And Scott Salisbury cut Magarey Medalist Grant Fielke out of the game to such an extent he was taken from the ground in the last quarter having won just six kicks.

Glenelg's centre line of Tony Symonds, Kym Hodgeman (until taken off for a rest at three-quarter time) and David Kernahan, along with follower Peter Maynard and rover Chris McDermott, provided

plenty of drive.

And across the half-forward line Tony Hall appeared to have the ball on a string, pulling in some fine marks, kicking four goals and having a hand in others, while centre half-forward Wayne Henwood gave a strong performance.

Glenelg had its place in the top three strengthened with Norwood losing to North, but coach Graham Cornes rightly pointed out that there still was some way to go before making certain of the important double chance.

However, he was feeling a lot happier than the last time Glenelg met the Bloods, in round nine.

The reigning premier lost to West at Richmond by 62 points - the biggest loss Cornes had suffered in his time as coach at the Bay.

The loss was Glenelg's sixth in its nine games, and it remained in seventh place. West, on the other hand, had won six of its nine games and stayed second.

Since then the sides have swapped positions, the Bays jumping to second with eight wins in nine games and West crashing to seventh with just two wins in nine matches.

"When we were second there were four or five West players in the State side."

"But at this stage, if you were selecting a State side, there would probably be only one - Mark Mickan," Cahill said.

Despite that, the Bays' inaccuracy still gave West an outside chance of victory when they kicked two quick goals early in the last

term.

But there was no way Glenelg was going to surrender the game it had dominated for so long.

Hall, Symonds, McDermott and Carey all were outstanding.

Good news was the form of Kym Hodgeman, who has had such a wretched run with injuries this year.

He went into the centre when Alan Stringer was ruled unfit and picked up 16 kicks and 15 handballs before three-quarter time when Cornes opted for some fresh legs in the final term.

The Bloods' best for the game possibly was rover Leon Grosser.

But West's coach John Cahill's record of never having a team finish lower than third in SA looks set to be broken. "It's going to be very hard from here," he admits.
