




May 3: South v North (Football Park); Sturt v Woodville (Adelaide); Cen-tral v Glenelg (Elizabeth);

The Warriors yesterday made a mockery of the common belief they were the joke of football when they laughed all the way from Football Park after beating Glenelg.

They've been called the "Woodville spooners;" been subjected to the harshest ridicule after some pathetic performances, but today they can command the utmost res-

Woodville entered the showdown with the reigning premier against incredible odds.

Only once in the previous six seasons had it won two games in succession; it was playing a side with twice as much games experience; and 13 had not played more than 30 senior games.

And yet the Warriors not only beat the champs. they taught them how any side can triumph with courage and faith.

The first sign of guts came at the quarter time when follower break Harris Kevin stretched out on a cement slab by the coach's bench and had stitches inserted above a gashed eye without any pain killer. He was back on within minutes.

The faith stemmed from the appointment of Malcolm Blight as coach after the 1982 season.

This great man himself was laughed at because he left the glamor of the VFL to coach a side would win a premiership before Buck Rogers returned from the 21st century. Sure, the Warriors still

have a long way to go. but at least they are on the track.

Blight has used 90 players for his league side since taking control, 48 of them rookies. Week after week he has asked them to believe in themselves and instil pride into the club.

There was jubilation in the Woodville changerooms after the match. Players and supporters sang, and I was expecting Blight to cartwheel through the door in a grand entrance,

But he hardly smiled. There was no hint of ecstasy, and the tone of his voice was the same as when he has so often talked about a losing performance.

But by hell it came through that he was proud of his men.

He said he knew the message had finally got through to his players that they should realise they could win games. they could be competitive. and they could enjoy their football as much as anyone else from another

Blight, in his first year as non-playing coach. described the victory as tremendously satisfying like most wins were.

Proud

"The players deserved it because they kept on working and they really wanted to win," he said.

"It was a good win. mainly because it's our best start to a season when you take into consideration we have won five out of 10 including the Escort Cup games. and been around the place in others.

"I have never doubted the effort the players have put in while I've been back. They haven't bitched about anything and I feel pleased for them that they are winning games."

But Blight said no one at Woodville should get carried away because it was only part of a progression to the ultimate goal.

But few could doubt Woodville has become of age. This season it has beaten Norwood, South (Escort Cup). Torrens. and yesterday. South, Glencig.

Perhaps more importtantly, it has given a damn good fight for victory in every match. No longer can it be associated with that old pop group, the Easybeats.

Warriors the huddled into a small room within the changerooms after the match, a young player yelled to supporters: mingling "It's only the beginning.

He was right. And the last words from the "There's coach were: Monday, training Wednesday and Friday."

Last night and today the Warirors celebrated, and unlike past fleeting moments of glory, they are ready to brush their jubilation rside and be ready for another great


