Kevin Neale, eyes glazed and choked with emotion, leapt from the coach's bench and hugged his gallant Bulldogs after they beat Glenelg by 10 points at Elizabeth Oval yesterday.

The scenes were reminiscent of finals glory, but according to the "Cowboy," the triumph - indeed the way they achieved it - meant so much more.

"We won a battle in the fight for survival," Neale explained.

He was not referring to his job as coach, even though the pressure was there with Central District languishing at the bottom of the premiership ladder.

"It was the club striving to survive." he said. "If we continued the way we were going, who knows if the support would have still been there in a couple of years to enable the club to keep going."

There was no question that Neale was still the champ in the hearts of the Bulldog loyalists before the match when they applauded a magnificent banner which read: "We're all behind Cowboy 100% so let's play like it."

And so they did, just as if they really were playing in a grand final. Even the Governor was there.

The times had been tough for Neale with Central winning only one match in five, plus finishing bottom in the Escort Cup series.

Along his road of desperation he had axed some of the biggest names in the game and copped the flak. On the eve of yesterday's match he called a special team meeting in a bid to halt the slide. Neale asked his men to play

desperation football and they obviously responded.

But during those painfully losing moments he said he had never given up hope that his players would fight back.

"I know I was copping a lot of the blame for the losses, so too were the other selectors and the players. Over the past week or two it's been spread around," he

"But the players won this game, not me, not anyone else. It's always the players who determine a result and at the moment I feel bloody proud of them."

Neale has always called a spade a spade, and has certainly given his players a tongue lashing in recent weeks.

But moments after the game, when they had finished singing and cheering, he poured heaps of praise on them to their tired faces.

With a mouth full of gum, he told them: "See what we have achieved by having 20 players giving 100 per cent. See what we can do if we play desperation football."

He went on t osay: "You were magnificent."

Neale tried everything during the tense battle with the reigning premier. He sent his runner, former club champion Peter Nicks, out 52 times with messages to his players. In contrast, Glenelg coach Graham Cornes sent his runner out 14 times.

Nicks told players to get off the ground, lift their game, but on so many occasions, "well done from the coach."

Cornes said after the match nothing should be taken away from Central's victory. "They deserved it," he said,

But he was also pleased with his men because he felt they put in the effort.

Sure, like any coach he was not impressed with the mistakes which were made, but he still acknowledged that the Tigers certainly did not lack heart.

Neale walked slowly out of the changerooms and said he had a dinner with his fellow Central mates, Peter Page, Kris Grant, and Glenelg football director, Harry Kernahan.

"We arranged this a month ago when we went on a fishing trip, Neale explained. "I reckon Harry will talk about the 40 schnapper we caught."



Cahill elated at win

The 10-point win was by no means a decisive triumph . . . but didn't they celebrate after the game.


Support for the Bulldogs always is strong on their home turf, but yesterday the fans found extra voice to help the side through an absorbing 100 minutes of footy.
