

MIKE'S MEN POWER AWAY

A goldmine of football talent called the Jarman brothers - Darren and Andrew yesterday stole centre stage at Football Park and steered North Adelaide into the grand final.

They reaffirmed their millionaire status by overwhelming Glenelg in the Roosters' convincing second semi-final triumph.

North should wrap the Jarman brothers in cotton wool until their next show on October 4 - so valuable are they to the club's premiership quest.

Darren again displayed his football genius from the pivot and Andrew his usual flair as a follower.

They had a stunning influence on the game and the other grand finalist must dim their lights to have a strong chance of winning the flag.

The Tigers did not come close to nullifying them.

Darren's supremacy forced opposition centreman Alan Stringer to a forward flank in the second half and his replacement, David Marshall, was only slightly more success-

And Andrew snuffed out one of Gleneig's most damaging players. Peter Maynard, early in the clash.

Andrew's greatest impact was in the first term when his team-mates were botching plays with unforced er-

He was the stabiliser during North's nervous start with crisp, sure ball handling.

But even he missed a "gimme" goal half-way through the quarter. He atoned with the Roosters' maiden goal just before the first break.

Glenelg had built an important initiative by the markably cool Darren, only 19, used his superb ballgetting skills to crush that ascendancy by half-time.

Nunan: Confident

North Adelaide charged into its twenty fourth grand final with a 24-point victory over Glenelg in a magnificent second semi-final at Football Park yesterday.

And jubilant coach Mike Nunan said he believed his gallant Roosters were a far better side than this time last year when they had their premiership hopes shattered by the Tigers.

"They have more maturity and experience now." he said.

Nunan, obviously quietly confident North could capture its twelfth flag since the turn of the century, was full of praise for his players despite the shocking kicking for goal in the pacy first term.

"They were very excited about playing in this final. We were so keen to do well, but we were over anxious," he said.

"I thought we played good football around the ground in the first quarter, but finishing off the play was the worst I have seen in a final."

Nunan said he was not thinking about which side North would probably meet in the grand final


showdown. And Cornes said he did not have a preference for the team-he would like to meet next Saturday.

Glenelg wingman David Kernahan is doubtful for the preliminary final after being knocked out by a solid hip-and-shoulder bump during the first term. He was taken to Flinders Medical Centre suffering from concussion.

The Tigers must also be concerned with rover Chris McDermott who has been plagued by a shoulder injury. He was kickless in two quarters and was again well below his usual brilliant best.

The victory was only North's second against Glenelg at Football Park and, remarkably, the margin was the same.

WARRIOR GOAL HERO WINS FINAL SPOT

Woodville yesterday omitted Robert Bowman and included Brett Mackereth in its side for only his second game of the season, for the first semi-final against Port Adelaide at Football Park today.

And centreman Ron Fuller has proved his fitness at training, but will wear protective headgear after gashing an ear in the elimination final against Norwood last Sunday.

Fuller, who left the field in the second quarter against the Redlegs, after a brilliant first term, wore the headgear at training during the week.

Woodville team manager, Mr Trevor Ryan, said the headgear would be worn as a precaution in case Fuller recieved a knock.

Fuller's clash in the centre with Port's Magarey Medallist Greg Anderson, who showed at training Friday he had overcome concussion suffered in the qualifying final, will be crucial.

Mackereth returns to the league side after playing only one senior game this season.
