Key North Adelaide defender David Wildy is expected to miss the rest of the season with a dislocated right shoulder.

The loss of Wildy, the most consistent back pocket in the competition, is a major blow to the Roosters' premiership hopes.

North's 11-point win over West yesterday has assured it of top spot.

But Port and Norwood gave notice of a tremendous battle for the vital double chance, while Glenelg slumped to a shock 12-point defeat by lowly South Adelaide.

Port destroyed a lack-lustre Woodville by 61 points and Norwood outgunned Torrens in the final term to emerge 51-point victor.

Both Port and Norwood traditional crowdpullers - are running hot in the build-up to the finals.

With Norwood and Woodville on 12 wins and Glenelg and Port on 11, the race for the top three is wide open.

Norwood appears to have the toughest draw.

It plays Glenelg on Saturday, and then Sturt, North and Port.

Woodville plays West, Central, Torrens and North; Glenelg plays Norwood, Port, West and Sturt; Port plays Sturt, Glenelg, Central and Norwood.

Wildy was taken to Hutt St Private Hospital last night.

North coach Mike Nunan said: "He has a dislocated shoulder and the early diagnosis is that it's unlikely he'll be available for the rest of the year."

Football can be an amazing unceremonious defeat at the hands of the bottom team the next.

The charge for a third consecutive premiership – which looked so strong after last Sunday's 26-point win over leader North Adelaide - has suffered a severe setback with the possibility of the double chance slipping from the Tigers' grasp.

And all this in a game which most observers predicted would be merely a percentage booster for the Tigers.

With Port Adelaide and Norwood running out winners yesterday, and Woodville maintaining a game's breathing space despite yesterday' loss to Port, Glenelg has dropped to fourth on the


