


Inside: Will we beat the Vics?

Glenelg's lovable giant, Peter Carey, donned his famous No 5 black and gold guernsey for the 400th time yesterday amid a wave of emotion and congratulations.

As he graced the Bay Oval with his sons, Matthew and Justin, 9803 jubilant fans gave him a rousing reception.

His teammates, West Torrens reserves players and umpires formed a guard in his honor and the big moment came to break a giant banner which read: "Tribute to the only champion captain of captains".

But like Richmond's Kevin Bartlett, who set the previous club games record, Carey had difficulty bursting through the banner.

And after the match, which the Tigers won by 29 points, his teammates carried him off the field in scenes reminiscent of the premiership glory he has relished three times.

The first man to shake his hand after the game was former teammate and now opponent, Eagles coach Paul Weston.

MELBOURNE: South Australia's rovers yesterday had the perfect tune up for this week's match against Victoria at Football Park.

Tony McGuinness, John Platten and Mark Naley all played well in the VFL. However, Victoria's No 1 rover, Dale Weightman, broke his left hand againt North Melbourne at the MCG on Friday.

Weightman, Victoria's best player against SA last year, also faces the VFL tribunal tomorrow on two striking charges and one alleged time wasting offence.

This means the Victorian selectors will have a close look at Geelong's Andrew Bews and the Sydney Swans' Barry Mitchell at Kardinia Park today.

McGuinness kicked six goals for Footscray in its 32-point win over Brisbane. Platten had 29 posessions for Hawthorn in its 114-point win over Essendon.

Naley kicked two goals for Carlton in its 22-point win over Fitzroy and was one of his side's best players.

"I'm 60 - I have been for a few years and refuse to get older - and I've watched all of Glenelg's grand final victories, and I reckon Peter is the best player we've ever

Carey played in ruck until 10 minutes before the final siren, and coach, Graham Cornes, said his courage and ability to battle hard right to the end was typical of this champion.

"Not many players could have worked or tried so hard, especially after so many games," Cornes said.

Carey said he reflected on his 17 seasons during the week . . . the premierships, disappointments, and especially the friendships he had made in football, something which he treasured.

But yesterday, the only important thing on his mind was a Glenelg victory.

And triumph the Tigers did, capping a "Super" day for one of the game's greats.



It was certainly not Glenelg's best performance in the captain's 400 games, but it was still full of merit because of the way it produced tenacity under pressure.

The Eagles gave away a 27-point start in the first term, and each time they got within a kick, Glenelg merely ignored the threat and resumed control.

Coach Paul Weston best summed it up by saying the difference between a premiership side and a team striving for success was shown at the crucial stages.

While Torrens made mistakes to ruin the comebacks, Glenelg kept calm and weathered the storm.

A typical example was late in the game when an Eagle defender kicked across goal and accidentally found Craig Budarick who then kicked one of his seven superb goals.

Glenelg made errors, but not as many at such devastating moments.

The match was relatively even - until Glenelg showed its superiority during the final 10 minutes and made the margin greater on the scoreboard than the difference in ability.

Torrens, to its credit, had a "real go". It battled the odds of playing against the hype over Carey's grand occasion, the fact it was played at the Bay, and few rated it a chance.

Glenelg showed its true fighting spirit when the pressure was on, and obviously apart from the premiership points, one of the most pleasing aspects was the performance of Budarick.

He has improved every week in his debut season, and yesterday he put his act together with some fine marking, accurate kicking and impressive team play.

The Tigers now have a dangerous ace, the much needed bite in the forward lines.

And, of course, there was the star of the show, Carey.

He played a fine game to win a majority of the centre taps, but his opponent, Chris Lindsay, shaded him around the ground with some tremendous marking.

Torrens rover/forward Kevin Taylor had an absorbing duel with Scott Salisbury, and both were key contributors.

Damien Christensen was also effective for the Eagles on the ball, while their defenders worked tirelessly.

Weston was creative across half-back, while Lee Robson was a tower of strength at full back.

The match, at times, was scrambly when too many players were too quick to fall over.

But the fans were rewarded with some magical moments - when Winton captured his goal, he jumped around like one of Wally May's startled gazelles and typified the exciting spirit which Glenelg's newcomers have injected in to the side.

Torrens has improved dramatically from last season, but it still has to learn how to sustain its run and not to look at the winning post while making the
