Yes, we'll go national

South Australia will not enter any expanded national football competition until 1989.

That's not a fact. It's my opinion. It is based, however, on knowledge of a timetable scenario set out to ensure

we enter on the best possible terms. I believe when the vote is taken next month - not by June 30 as the VFL wants - the SANFL will resolve to join the expanded competition in 1989.

It will then have 12 months to fully plan and staff the Adelaide club as well as negotiate and clinch the favorable terms it desires.

That year also will provide the breathing space to recast the SANFL competition; to reduce it to eight, perhaps even six, clubs and to plan a revised style of premiership with the finals in November after the national competition has ended.

The hierarchy already has resolved not to be rushed or panicked into a premature decision.

It has seen and absorbed the myriad mistakes made by the WAFL in its senseless haste to sample the VFL pie.

Under no circumstances will it fall into the same unbelievably stupid trap of surrendering the rights to control the club to an outside interest.

And it knows full well the VFL prizes not only its participation but the use of the jewel that is Football Park - so much so, that if given a firm commitment for 1989, the VFL will not countenance the attempted re-location of a struggling Melbourne side here.

By recognising the need to pay the \$4 million licence fee, the SANFL already has made a concession towards

But my tip is '89, not '88



But it is a concession that strengthens its hand with the six other major negotiating points.

Clearly it will stand solidly on the issues of TV, programming, the right to exclude SA players from the draft for at least two years and to have its travelling costs paid from the VFL pool.

Its stated aim to have the name of the competition changed is not, however, etched in stone and could be conceded in the knowledge that any national competition would benefit by identifying itself as such anyway.

Its other aim is to secure a pro-portional share of the VFL equalisation fund rather than an equal portion in the knowledge its percentage would be

But it can get around that anyway by pre-selling season membership in the Adelaide club as only cash admissions go into the fund.

The League's planners already have decided how an Adelaide club would be staffed (three members each from the

10 clubs, plus selected imports to fill noticeable gaps), run, marketed and promoted.

And only two things now stand in the way of it happening.

The first could be avoided should the league rescind its decision to seek again the public feeling on the matter through a survey.

Should the SA football public vote overwhelmingly against joining the nat-ional competition — as seems possible given the usual emotion involved in reducing the number of clubs locally it would be difficult to then proceed.

Instead of a survey, the League directors should go ahead with what they have been elected to do - make decisions in the best interests of football.

However, the possibility does exist the directors will vote against the expansion into the VFL. Three clubs are said to be opposed,

others are unsure and the country delegate is also to vote in a ballot that requires a two thirds majority.

By the time of the crucial meeting. however, there should be sufficient evidence to show football here would be overwhelmed unless we go united and organised into the national sphere.

The time to do that is 1989. Not before. And that's how it will turn out.

"Too many players were soft. Too many players have been riding along with the key players who have been doing the work.

"When they did get over the ball, they were found wanting.

Slow death for Panthers

South Adelaide suffered a slow, agonising death for season '87 at the hands of a reluctant executioner at Glenelg Oval yesterday.
