These were the dramas in yesterday's second series of SA league football, highlighted by victories to Glenelg, West Adelaide and Central District which saw them as the only unbeaten sides.

Ralph hobbled off the Bay Oval with a right ankle injury during the second term against Port after treading in a sprinkler hole while chasing a Port defender.

Glenelg officials were unsure of the extent of his injury. He will have treatment this morning in a bid to be fit to play against West at Richmond on Saturday.

Norwood forward Paul Sheedy wrenched his right knee but last night club officials were hopeful he would be available for the clash with North at Football Park on Saturday.



Glenelg pacesetter

Feeling worse are Sturt and South Adelaide. They filled the bottom positions last season and they're there again after heavy losses to Norwood and North Adelaide respectively.

Bays give wharfies a whipping By Peter Prime

"We'll whip the wharfies" read the Glenelg banner as the Tiger brigade ran onto the Bay Oval yesterday to do battle with the might of Port Adelaide.

Yes, in the final analyis, Glenelg did end up taking the two premiership points and the plaudits.

But for three quarters yesterday, Graham Cornes' Tigers had been well and truly tamed by a spirited Magpie combination.

Expectations around the Brighton Road ground were for a titanic, do-ordie final term climax between two fierce, unrelenting sides.

Glenelg held only a 13-point advantage at three-quarter time, with the Magpies having the use of the breeze in the last

But for a number of seasons now, the smooth-moving Glenelg machine has a habit of ruining likely great contests.

<u>Biggest</u> threat

With a systematic, paralysing 30-minute blitz, it booted a magnificent 7.2 to bury Port and storm to a welldeserved victory.

For the statistically-minded among us, it was just another notch in the Tigers belt.

Since 1980, records show Glenelg poses the biggest threat at its home

It has won an incredible 48 of its 60 games at the Bay - almost an 80 per cent winning record.

For Port, yesterday was a test of character for the battle-wearing Magpie line-up.

It was their third match in eight days, following its opening round triumph over Surt last week and its loss to Woodville in the Escort Cup final on Wednesday evening.

Glenelg, on the other hand, went into the showdown fresh after two-weeks' respite from the victory over Norwood. For three quarters yesterday there was really little between the sides.

But to use a hackneyed term, when the going got tough, the tough got going.

Glenelg used the ball brilliantly in the final term, it's workrate improved dramatically and it had players willing to take a chance to further the cause.
