as timid Sturt falls in a heap

Glenelg dismissed any lingering doubts about being a worthy finalist when it slaughtered a timid Sturt by 90 points at the Glenelg Oval yesterday.

And as the scoreboard suggested, the performance rated as one of Glenelg's most authoritive and stunning victories this season.

Yesterday's match, tipped to be one of the great last minor round clashes. turned into a flop.

Glenelg knew at quarter time, when it trailed by seven points, that it had made the finals by simply looking at the final scores from the Woodville-North match.

Sturt knew before the match that it would play in the elimination final. The only doubt was its opponent.

it simply went through the motions for the remaining three quarters. The Blues seemed to lose

interest in the match and. at times, there were hints from a few of its players that they didn't want to get hurt or reported and risk missing the big replay.

Glenelg reacted far differently. Sensing that finals feeling, it set about destroying its opposition.

Sturt allowed Glenelg to get its finals act back into gear, and for that, it may well pay a huge penalty next Sunday.

There was that touch of arrogance about the Tigers yesterday. They niggled their opponents - letting them know exactly who was the boss.

In fact, their exhuberance became so great by midway through the last quarter that coach Graham Cornes took the volatile Alan Stringer, one of Glenelg's best players, off the field, almost as if he was trying to protect him from becoming too authoritive.

Perhaps the best thing to come out of the match for Glenelg, apart from rekindling that winning feeling, was that it was powerful in the forward lines.

It had an invincible setup with Jim West at centre half-forward, Chris Melican at full forward, and resting ruckmen, Peter Carey and Gary Christie, in a pocket.

These big men kicked 14 of the team's 24 goals, with Melican (six) and West (five) the main destroyers.

Rubbing salt into Sturt's gaping wound was the fact Glenelg full back Chris Duthy was forced off during the third quarter because of a calf muscle injury and Cornes was able to show off his depth by shifting West into defence and John Schneebichler to centre half-forward.

"Schneezer" didn't kick any goals, but he set up a few, and West continued his fine form in the backlines.

This proved another bonus from the match ... reinforcing Cornes's belief that he had more than one option for the key forward

Glenelg was far superior because of its overall team play. It did not have a player who rested on past glories or lacked commitment, and it seemed unjust to leave a player out of its best player list.

There was Chris McDermott (as usual) with his lightening passes and creativeness, John Seebohm and Wayne Stringer who worked well across the halfback line, Nick Chigwidden who did many fine things including a miraculous goal from a left-foot snap alongside the left pocket boundary line, and David Marshall and Peter Maynard who have lost none of their ability to rise to an important occasion.
