Norwood's dramatic slump continued at the Parade yesterday and it has been rocked by yet another injury — full back Tom Warhurst may have broken his left hand.

And while X-rays and medical reports this morning probably will confirm the bad news, which would keep him out for at least five matches, coach Neil Balme will be seeking answers to the Redlegs' woes.

Their 65-point drubbing by North Adelaide was their fifth loss in six weeks and they have remained in seventh spot. Adding to its problems, half-back Brenton Klaebe was reported in the reserves for allegedly striking.

Another big-name player also was reported in the reserves — Port Adelaide's Andrew Obst for allegedly striking.


Norwood is not alone in the desperate struggle to recapture last year's form — grand finalist Glenelg lost to Central District by four points at the Bay and is lamenting in eighth position.

Glenelg now must brace itself for Saturday's Football Park clash with inconsistent West Torrens which beat Woodville by 20 points.

West Adelaide, the early pacesetter, lost its fourth successive game, this time at Football Park by nine points to Sturt which recorded only its second win of the season. As expected, Port toppled South Adel-

As expected, Port toppled South Adelaide at Alberton, but only by 26 points.

Brilliant North centreman Darren Jarman was carried off by stretcher in the third quarter against Norwood. A story swept the oval he had broken his left leg, but club officials said he had only sprained an ankle and hoped he would play against Sturt at Adelaide Oval on Saturday.

Dogs grip spot in five

Gallant Central District yesterday summoned all of its fighting qualities to fashion a superb four-point victory against Glenelg at Glenelg Oval.

The win, secured through sheer courage and desire in a pulsating encounter, enabled Neil Kerley-coached Central to strengthen its grip on a top five berth and provided much hope for the future.

Glenelg's loss — its third in as many matches at Brighton Road this season — meant it had equalled a 28-year-old record.

Not since 1961, when Stan Wickham guided the Tigers into seventh place in an eight-team competition, has Glenelg lost its first three matches at home.

Central's win was all the more meritorious considering its pre-match planning was upset with the loss of Jamie Thomas and Peter Jonas, with hamstring complaints, and Craig Braddy, because of influenza.

The performances, however, of replacements Greg McAdam, elevated for his first SANFL match since 1983, and Keith Allan were symptomatic of the Bulldogs' insistence on success.

Allan, entrusted with the dual difficulty of centre half-back and opponent James West, turned in a sterling performance after it had appeared West would have a field day with two early goals.

McAdam, briefly introduced during the first quarter, resumed at three quarter-time and proceeded to have a profound influence on the match, as did mostly subdued younger brother Gilbert, and provided a steadying factor for Central's game.


It was this kind of commitment which proved crucial when the game was there to be won.

The match, full of a seriousness that only umpires Michael Abbott and Max Cuzzocrea managed to lighten with a series of incredible interpretations, hung in the balance until game's end.

Glenelg, fully aware of the dangers of inheriting a 3-5 win-loss record, mounted several last-ditch attempts but in the end lacked its usually smooth finishing touches.

It was during these full-blooded stampedes that Central's enormous character and courage shone out.

Leading by just three points, Central seemed doomed as Tony MacTavish sent the Bays scuttling into attack and the ball into the path of strong-running Adam Garton.

Vice-captain Roger Girdham crowned a magnificent match with a wonderful interception before watching colleagues Paul Sullivan and Stephen Schwerdt dash goalwards.

A point, disappointingly, was the result. A goal would have been a much more just outcome but it ensured the match would stay alive even longer.

When it did finish, some five minutes later, Central's battle-weary troops were deliriously happy — and deservedly so.

Apart from an imposing beginning, when it cleared out to a 17-point advantage, Glenelg, at times, failed to exude its familiar ruthlessness and smooth running game.

More crucially, it could never sustain its occasional dominance of an opponent which refused to be intimdated, even during a heated, somewhat spiteful third quarter when Bay full forward John Fidge crashed heavily.

Aside from Girdham and captain Peter Kreig, Central boasted a host of spirited, intense competitors and gradually began to erode the classier influences of opponents David Marshall, Kym Hodgeman and Chris Melican.

Ruckman Peter Bubner and Grant Coffee, both responsible for timely and saving marks as well as gamefully battling taller opponets, and defenders Sullivan and Scott Lee contributed Neil Kerley said:

"It was a very committed team effort when the game could have gone either way. The players showed a lot of character."

Graham Cornes said:

"It was a very good, close, hard game. Even though we lost, our form is not bad. There were a few encouraging signs."

Glenelg's best were more sporadic. Centreman Marshall, rover Hodgeman and ruckman Melican, whose tapping was mostly first-class, could not be blamed for the defeat.
