After dominating the match for the first half, but squandering numerous opportunities, the Bulldogs went into the final quarter just one point down and kicking with the aid of a strong breeze.

But they capitulated, registering just five scoring shots to 11 against the fastfinishing boys from the Bay, losing 14.11 to

If Central fails to win another game this season, West and South will do battle on September 8 with the winner to compete in the finals. But while coach Neil Kerley

had every right to be seething after the 23-point loss, he did not show it.

About 4000 long-suffering Central District supporters and a handful of adventurous Glenelg fans were perched on the edges of their seats out at Elizabeth as Central threatened to give Glenelg a hiding.

After three-quarters of inspired football, Centrals played a final quarter as soft as the cream puffs supplied to the press box by the Central District Ladies Social Committee, and meekly conceded defeat to the tune of 23 points after leading at the first two breaks and trailing by just one point at three-quarter time. Centrals had failed to capitalise on

a screaming final term tail wind and let slip the chance to shore up its hold on fifth spot with a respectable win over second-placed Glenelg, but coach Neil Kerley was optimistic and philosophical about his side's bumpy ride to the finals from here. "You're never out of it until your

last chance is gone." Kerley said when asked how he thought his Bulldogs would fare in their next two drawn matches against ladder-leader Port Adelaide next week and thirdplaced North Adelaide in the final


