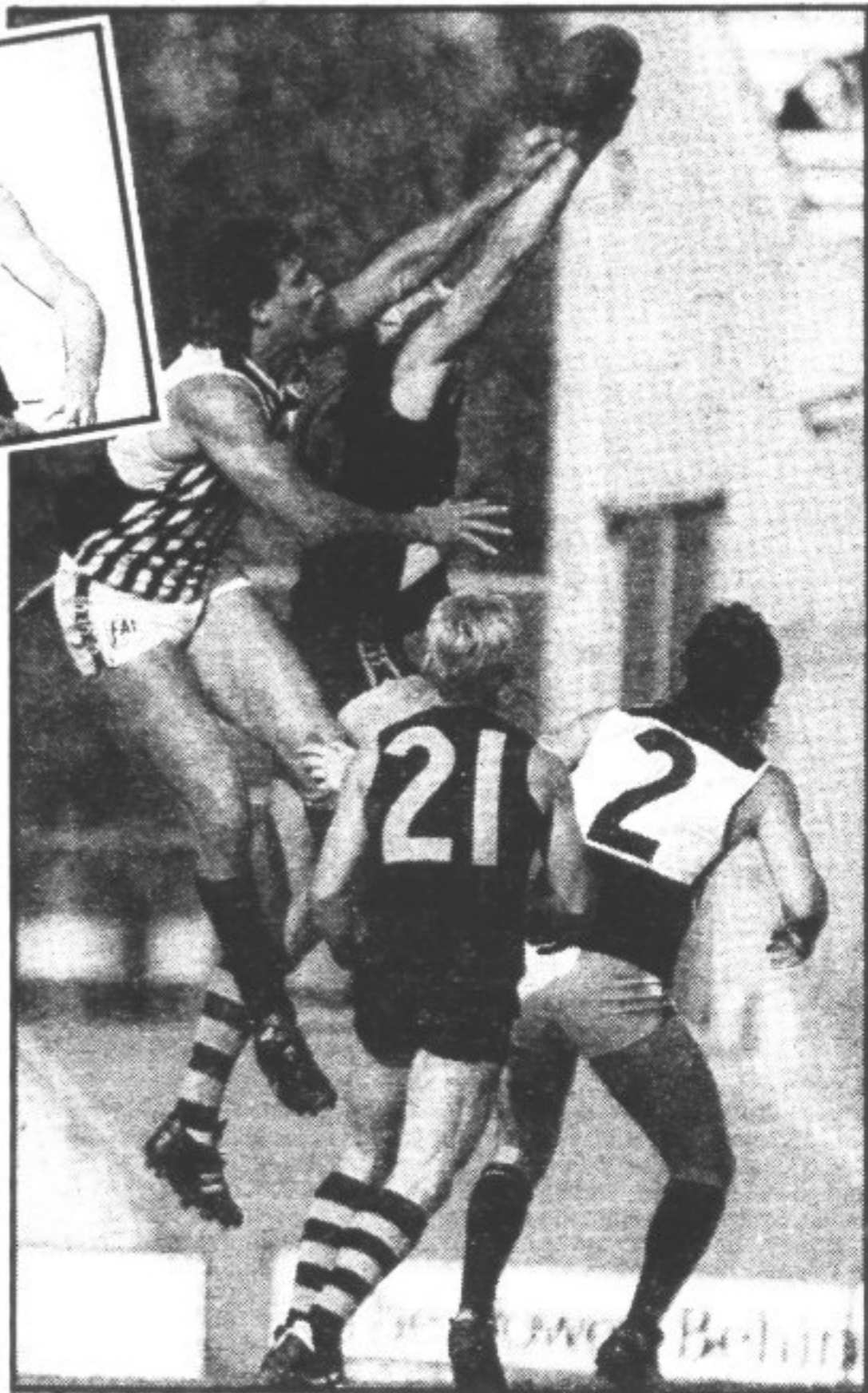

Port runs riot as Tigers go to sleep

The brewery chimney, as always still decked out in the colors of last winter's SANFL premier and runner-up, echoed the story of Glenelg and Port Adelaide's round 15 match at Football Park yesterday.

On the chimney, big black and white stripes symbolise Port's domination over the black and gold Bays in the 1991 grand final. The symbolism could have been painted especially for yesterday afternoon's result.

For Port Adelaide, unable to break past a powerful, controlled Glenelg in the first half, tossed aside a suddenly spiritless group of Tigers in the second to eventually win by 45 points.

Port Adelaide kicked four goals and 10 points in the last quarter.

After trailing by 24 points at half-time, Port had no trouble in asserting its authority in the third, and certainly the fourth terms.

The Tigers could manage only one point in the fourth quarter, for a second-half total of 1.5.

Port ran out winners 16.20 (116) to 10.11 (71) before a crowd of 7554.

It seemed almost every one of Kym Hodgeman's men had smoked something illegal, or maybe tossed down the odd Valium or two, at half-time — done something to slow themselves down so that even Nick Chigwidden was wandering around at snail's pace.

The Magpies, on the other hand, just did what you expect Port Adelaide to do in such circumstances: take the smallest opportunity, and utilise it to maximum effect.

Whatever it was that the Bays did to themselves at half-time, Hodgeman wasn't in on the secret. He had "no idea" why the run that had given Glenelg a four-goal lead at half-time so abruptly ceased, or why so many of his players simultaneously lost all commitment to winning the ball.

"I thought our work rate, commitment and desperation in the first half were fantastic, but just dropped off enormously at half-time," he said. "Our young blokes learned a big lesson today — you can't give a team like Port a sniff, or they'll come back at you like mad dogs."

"They showed us guts. When their forwards were hurting, they were prepared to run more, to fight for the black and white guernsey."

"Our guys, when the going went tough, they went missing."

Port had appeared dangerous in the opening minutes of the first quarter, but their ability to use possessions was nullified by the efforts of Tigers Jason Bromilow, Allan Bartlett, Simon Hele and Michael Barton, who together ensured Glenelg led by one point at quarter time.

The second term was all Glenelg, from the mark that gave John Fidge his second goal within the first 30 seconds, through goals to Craig Elias, Mansell (who kicked three in the quarter) and Fidge again, to Mansell's fourth for the half booted as the half-time siren sounded.

Running men all over the ground had contributed to the

24-point advantage Glenelg held as the teams walked down the race, and it seemed the Tigers could reverse the 12-point defeat the Magpies had inflicted upon them on Anzac Day.

But then came their exposure to whatever-it-was, and then came the "mad dogs". Suddenly Hele and Barton were non-existent; suddenly Stephen Williams, David Brown, Darryl Borlase and Adrian Settre were set free to run rampant over their ineffectual opponents — who seemed to kick or handpass to a black and white pullover whenever they did touch the ball, anyway.

According to Hodgeman's staff, Glenelg progressed from having 188 possessions in the first half to 131 in the second, and just how many of those 131 found their intended targets wouldn't enlighten Hodgeman's soul.

Port, on the other hand, improved from 48 and 49 kicks in the second and third quarters to 77 in the final term, with 10 of the 77 coming from the boot of best-on-ground Stephen Williams, nine from Borlase, and eight from the foot of Brown. And they found the people they were intended to reach.
