Pies find their fighting spirit

PREMIER Port Adelaide rebounded strongly yesterday to reverse a four-match losing streak and virtually cement its finals chances for 1991.

Celebrating captain Greg Phillips' 400th league appearance, Port held off old rival Norwood to win a vital match by 16 points at Alberton Oval.

The success took the pressure off coach John

Cahill, whose charges had been lambasted in previous weeks for being slow, hesitant and unworthy of the famous black-and-white guernsey.

But Glenelg, which contested last year's grand final, finds itself in real danger of missing the finals after its 19-point loss to premiership favorite South Adelaide.

South slips away after tough fight

Premiership favorite South Adelaide yesterday determinedly escaped the clutches of a persistent Glenelg to triumph by 19 points at Football Park.

Trailing by four points at three-quarter time, South subsequently added 6.3 to 2.4 to further endanger Glenelg's chances of contesting the major round and deprive the youthful Tiger outfit of the victory it probably should have enjoyed.

Preying on South's unusually poor first-half disposal and allowed to play a free-wheeling, attacking style of football, Glenelg had enough of the ball to set up victory.

But inaccuracy in front of goal permitted Glenelg only an 11-point half-time lead — 6.9 to 5.4 — when better finishing would have seemingly condemned the Panthers to their sixth defeat this season.

A blistering third-quarter onslaught, inspired by the silken touch of Magarey Medal public elect Mark Naley, saw South surge to the lead for the first time since the first quarter.

Leading by 16 points, South might have expected to bury the Tigers, whose creativity had been sharply curtailed by Darryl Hewitt's tagging of Glenelg playmaker Darren Mansell and better use of the ball out of defence.

But Glenelg struck back strongly, proving it was capable of matching it with the Football Park

who finished with five, Craig Elias, Lynden Bow and Mansell gave the underdog Glenelg the lead once more.

Andrew Brockhurst opened the final term decisively, kicking two quick goals as rover Paul Hallahan, who finished with 31 kicks in only his third match back from a collarbone injury, attempted to

keep the Tigers in the match.

Matthew Battams gave the Panthers much-needed breathing space at the seven-minute mark before a flurry of Glenelg chances to Hallahan, Hamish Stuart and Simon Hele — drifted wide.

Steven Schmid, who had kept a tight first-half rein on resting ruckmen Stewart McCully and Wayne Thornborrow, who might have won the game had he been able to hold more marks, was left to seal the Tigers' fate.

Two goals in three minutes, and another to Geoff Winton (who contributed three goals after coming off the interchange bench), pushed the Panthers to an unassailable 26-point lead.

A late goal to Jason Bromilow allowed Glenelg to reduce the deficit to 19 points before the siren sounded — all of which was of little consolation to coach Kym Hodgeman.
