

Killer glint in expectant eye of the Tiger

Glenelg, The Sleeping Giant, is awake.

Having been disturbed by Panthers and woken by Roosters, the Tigers now smell the blood of Eagles and have a distant whiff of the blood of Magpies.

To taste it, though, Glenelg must lift its performance to a much higher, smoother level than it showed against North Adelaide in Saturday's fierce, but unflattering, first semi-final at Football Park.

Glenelg coach Kym Hodgeman later had reason to say he was "proud" of his players' intrepid revival and to talk of "boys with character".

He even volunteered the opinion that "Glenelg would not have won this game four or five years ago".

But Hodgeman was realistic enough to admit: "We are only halfway through (the finals). We must improve. The players face another of the most important weeks of their football lives."

Traditionally, first semi-finals are among the toughest, even ugliest, of major-round matches, and this was no exception.

If a football team plays only as well as its opponent allows, then neither Glenelg nor North allowed the other to play very well here.

The over-riding factor for Glenelg was that it did almost everything wrong in the first 35 minutes yet it was good enough to recover and convert a 32-point deficit in the second quarter - 1.3 to 6.5 - into a six-point victory by outscoring North 13.8 to 7.6 over the last 85 minutes.

Glenelg did not capture the lead until 15 minutes into the third quarter - 10.8 to 9.8 but lost it again at nearly the 14-minute mark of the last quarter - 13.10 to North's 13.11 before a Michael Murphy goal and a Nick Chigwidden point secured its winning break.

The tightness of that grim, desperate last-quarter struggle was reflected in the number of scoring shots - only five, including three to Glenelg.

It was to North's great credit, just a week after the 17-goal hiding it received from the Eagles, that it looked much like the side of old in the first term.

Then it was able to run the ball out of defence, create loose men and score with familiar



precision - thanks, in no small part, to the acute goal-sense of little Brodie Atkinson, who potted three big ones.

There was no early hint of the anticipated nor feared mayhem. Indeed, Glenelg looked surprisingly tentative, dropping marks, taking too long to get rid of the ball, handpassing loosely, failing to check opponents and being slightly over-conscious of its crack full forward, John Fidge.

Glenelg's most ardent admirers would claim the bounce of the ball simply did not go the side's way, nor did some lineball umpiring decisions.

But you make your own luck

in football, and Glenelg was not making much of anything.

Five minutes into the second quarter, Hodgeman released captain Scott Salisbury from the interchange bench (for Grant Reubenicht) and, three minutes later, ruckman Gary Christie took over from Chris Melican.

Salisbury made his bruising presence felt immediately and Christie also climbed into the game.

Even more importantly, David Marshall won several crucial touches at centre and Fidge finally announced himself with three urgently-needed goals in nine minutes as suitably-inspired team-mates rose to the demanding challenge.

When Salisbury somehow sunk a long, floating bomb from across half-forward, you sensed the Tiger had been stirred from his long slumber and was back on the prowl.

A powerful third-quarter into a south-westerly wind - 5.3 to 4.3 - confirmed it, then the ability to withstand a courageous, gruelling last-quarter, in which North had slightly more use of the ball, earned Glenelg unquestionable entry into the preliminary final.

Over four quarters, Glenelg boasted more players who in-sisted on identification - none more than classy Marshall.

Follower Darren Mansell again was a prolific worker, as were rovers .Chigwidden and Paul Hallahan. Fidge's five goals were decisive and Lynden Bow won his wing.

Andrew McKay was his usual dashing self on a half-back. Chris Duthy was typically dependable in a back pocket and, significantly, full back Paul Rouvray and centre half-back John Seebohm quietened North's big-gun forwards, Michael Parsons and Peter Bennett. Wingman David Sanders, back pocket Steven Hamilton, follower Atkinson and half-backs Steven Barratt and Nick Holland were the most effective Roosters.

North coach Mike Nunan's lament: "... we just couldn't get that something that made the difference" - was an accurate assessment of his side's display on the day and of where the club is now.

Its 20 players on Saturday contained 11 heading for, or beyond, the age-30 barrier. Like old stayers, they have run their best races. And, still in racing parlance, most, at best, merely are plodding on gamely, bereft of essential, winning zip.

So North's Nunan era is over. In 12 seasons, The 'Little Master' guided the club into eight finals, including seven of the past eight. And North has played in live of the past seven grand finals, for two unforgettable premierships.

Fourth placing for North was quite a considerable feat after it had lost its first five matches. In 24 matches, including two finals, North's 11 losses were to the Eagles (four), Port Adelaide (three), Glenelg (two) and West Adelaide and South Adelaide.

Nunan rebuilt North into one of South Australia's finest, most respected teams, and stamped it with his own personality and signature.

North and Nunan have dared to be different, with an impressive, expressive flair - entertaining, aggressive, opinionated, sometimes controversial but, mercifully, never dull.

Little Mick leaves big boots to fill at Prospect and in a nineteam competition that has even more testing times ahead.

Has SA football really seen the last of him?
