They replaced Port Adelaide. which had the bye, on top of the ladder while Central lost its valuable double chance.

It means Port will play Glenelg. which beat West Adelaide by 43 points at Richmond Oval, in the qualifying final. Central will play Norwood, a 20-point winner over South Adelaide, in the elimin-

ation final. The SANFL will tomorrow confirm whether the finals, played as a double-header. will be on Saturday or Sunday. If the Crows beat Hawthorn in the APL elimination final in Melbourne today, the SANFL will avoid a clash with Adelaide's AFL second semi-final match.

The Eagles also clinched the minor premierships in the reserves and under-19s, and their under-17s finished third. Sturt, for the second time this season, crushed North Adelaide, by 57 points, but failed by 1.43 percent to haul itself off the bottom

spoon for a club-record fourth successive season.

Strong-marking forward Jim West's seven goals spearheaded Glenelg's comfortable 43-point win against West Adelaide in a scrappy struggle at Richmond Oval yesterday.

While Glenelg did enough to put the result beyond doubt early, it rarely stretched out as it will have to against Port Adelaide in next weekend's qualifying final.

Down 49 points at half-time - 4.5 to 12.6 - West outscored Glenelg 5.10 to 5.4 in the second half, but clearly did not convert enough of its scoring opportunities.

So the Bloods finished a disappointing, frustrating season in second-last place on the league ladder, after only four wins from 20 minor-round matches - the same as wooden-spooner Sturt.

If West sometimes played yesterday as though it was relieved its season was finished, Glenelg hardly looked to have sufficient spark to

ignite the finals series.

But coach Mark Williams was satisfied enough with the day's events.

"We're very happy to be back on winning terms again. Now we will start regrouping. Third spot has given us a great opportunity in the finals," Williams said.

"We'll come up better next weekend. We worked pretty hard today. We have to take that workrate into the qualifying final."

West coach Neil Kerley said: "We lost it in the first quarter when we didn't take advantage of the wind.

"Glenelg was much quicker, more alert and controlled the packs early. But I was pleased with our second half."

Williams replaced full forward John Pidge early in the last quarter, to ensure his fitness. Fidge, who strained a calf last week, kicked three goals, had a hand in others and will have benefited from the run.

The Bloods had no counter to Tiger ace West's powerful marking. whether he was in a forward pocket, at the goalfront or at centre halfforward.

Ross Gibbs was typically cool in defence for Glenelg, Simon Hele and David Marshall were regular providers across centre, Paul Hamilton did some good work across halfback, and Craig McRae was a slippery three-goal half-forward.

West's best players were scarce, although Peter Banfield, Robin McKinnon, Dean Bowtell, Mark Mickan and Leon Grosser probably paid their way the most.
