Strong Legs stomp Tigers

Glenelg fell victim to the Arnold Schwarzenegger of the SANFL yesterday when its finals run was terminated by a superior Norwood at Football Park.

Norwood's 44-point win - its ninth from 12 elimination finals over the past 14 years - was an emphatic reminder it is not without a chance of contesting successive grand finals.

Its telling last quarter, kicking 8.5 until Glenelg scored a complimentary 3.1 during time-on, was awe-

Glenelg, only permitted entry to the finals series because of Norwood's win over North Adelaide last week, threatened to recover in the third quarter. But its Fightback was straight out of Dr Hewson's book of lost causes.

This was a magnificent response by the Redlegs to the call by coach Neil Craig to work that bit harder to cover the loss of their captain, Garry McIntosh, sidelined nursing the right ankle he broke during training on Tuesday night.

Frustration for the vanguished

Other vital elements were the authority displayed by Norwood's big men, an impressive team game and unquestionable discipline.

The Redlegs made a brisk start. kicking three goals in the opening seven minutes, and always had Glenelg desperately chasing and battling to recover.

Norwood controlled the early play because its big men, especially Matthew Robran at full forward, mastered the art of knocking the ball to the ground and found their smaller teammates who made better position in front of the packs.

Glenelg, which had beaten Norwood in their three encounters this year, was denied the chance to create smooth flowing play because of the tight checking imposed by the Redlegs. As the match indeed the season - drew to a close, the frustration was clearly

evident on the vanquished. Norwood kept itself in front by the many other qualities which indicates a good side, including countless smothers and strong

shepherding.

It cruised to a 23-point quartertime lead, and increased the pressure to 41 points midway through the second. But Glenelg responded with two quick goals caused by a lapse in concentration and discipline by Norwood.

Glenelg, however, squandered a half-time lead with three poor attempts at goal, and this hurt was compounded by an additional five misses at the start of the third

Desperate for accuracy, Darren Mansell, one of Glenelg's best, kicked three brilliant goals on the run, and it was only intermitting goals from Norwood which allowed it to lead by 10 points at three-quarter time.

Glenelg seemed to be on a roll and threatened to steal this sudden-death final. But, ultimately, it was only wishful thinking by its fans as Norwood released punishing blows.


The Tigers were hurt by the loss of Peter Berbakov when he had his left leg broken within 40 seconds of the start of the last term.

A significant change in Norwood's make-up was the switching of Robran with ruckman Matthew Primus. While Robran asserted his authority, allowing Norwood to clear consistently from the centre square, Primus had a positive effect and forced Glenelg coach Mark Williams to move him best big man, Stuart McCully, to full

The move brought almost immediate results as Primus pushed one of his immaculate knocks down to the waiting hands of Billy Dolan to set the last-quarter steamrolling of Glenelg in motion.

The sealing goal came a few minutes later when Primus chased vigorously and applied a magnificent tackle on Ben Roehrich. This allowed Kym Russell to kick Norwood's 17th goal and boost the margin to 34 points.

Glenelg was floored. After pouring so much fruitless energy into that mid-game, third-quarter revival, it had neither the talent nor the physical ability to respond to Norwood's surge of power.
