# \$1m pledge to second **AFL** team

have already been promised \$1m in sponsorships should they combine and be South Australia's second team in the AFL, as soon as 1996.

And in another crucial twist in the continuing AFL licence saga, both clubs have vehemently denied they will still merge in the unlikely event of their bid being unsuccessful. They say it's the AFL or nothing.

Their sponsorship target is \$2.5 million, and the overwhelming response after approaching only 10 per cent of the specific firms in major industries they have in mind, is, to say the least, extraordinary.

According to John Potter, who heads the Norwood-Sturt AFL taskforce, the response is a strong indication business houses want a second AFL team out of Adelaide and, specifically, one opposite to the other side of town where the Crows are based.

"We have received letters of intent and we have been pleasantly surprised by the profound support in the market place,", Potter said.

"We have identified specific major business houses or industries, ensuring none clash, and the support for a second team this side of town has been tremendous."

Potter said Norwood and Sturt could not stress enough that their proposed AFL plan was a merger, in stark contrast to a takeover by either club, and their ultimate plan depended on their AFL bid being approved. "No AFL approval; no SANFL merger," according to high-ranking club sources.

The Norwood-Sturt syndicate, like its major AFL bid rival, Port Adelaide, has yet to publicly reveal its full AFL hand. Details of its final submission will not be released until the closing date of tenders to the SA Football Commission, on August 31.

Norwood and Sturt are asking their members to attend special meetings, at

Norwood and Sturt Thursday, August 25, two days before these clubs are due to meet again, in the second-last SANFL minor round series.

The other AFL proposed bids, a combination of Glenelg and South Adelaide, and the cartel of Central District, North Adelaide, West Adelaide and Woodville-West Torrens, appear to be fading as the tender date closes.

It seems as if the SA Football Commission will ask the AFL Commission to approve its choice between the Norwood-Sturt and Port bids. Basically, it is a case of Norwood-Sturt producing a far better financial and supporter-base plan, with their location being the preferred opposite side of town to the the Crows, against Port's overwhelming case of club and football emotion in contrast to the Crows.

Should the SANFL and AFL Commissions base their votes on the expected business and geographic plans, the Norwood-Sturt bid should win handsomely, but in competition, Port could boast intense club emotion.

Regardless of the successful bid, SA football supporters might struggle to recognise the successful club. Port won't be the Magpies or the black and white side of the AFL, and possibly, it might not be known as Port Adelaide because, from a marketing point of view, the name might be too close to that of the Adelaide Football Club.

And from a Norwood-Sturt view, the clubs will be merging, incorporating their colors.

The SA Football Commission, with its deciding members being Max Basheer, Leigh Whicker, Wayne Jackson, Peter Page and John Spillane, will undoubtedly be pursuaded by the fact the Crows and Port are "only down the road" while Norwood-Sturt are on the opposite side of town.

Like all football clubs, the Crows, Norwood, Sturt and Port have their variations of their specific clubrooms, to the "chardonnay set", but the geographical facts are unquestionably in favor of the Norwood-Sturt bid.
